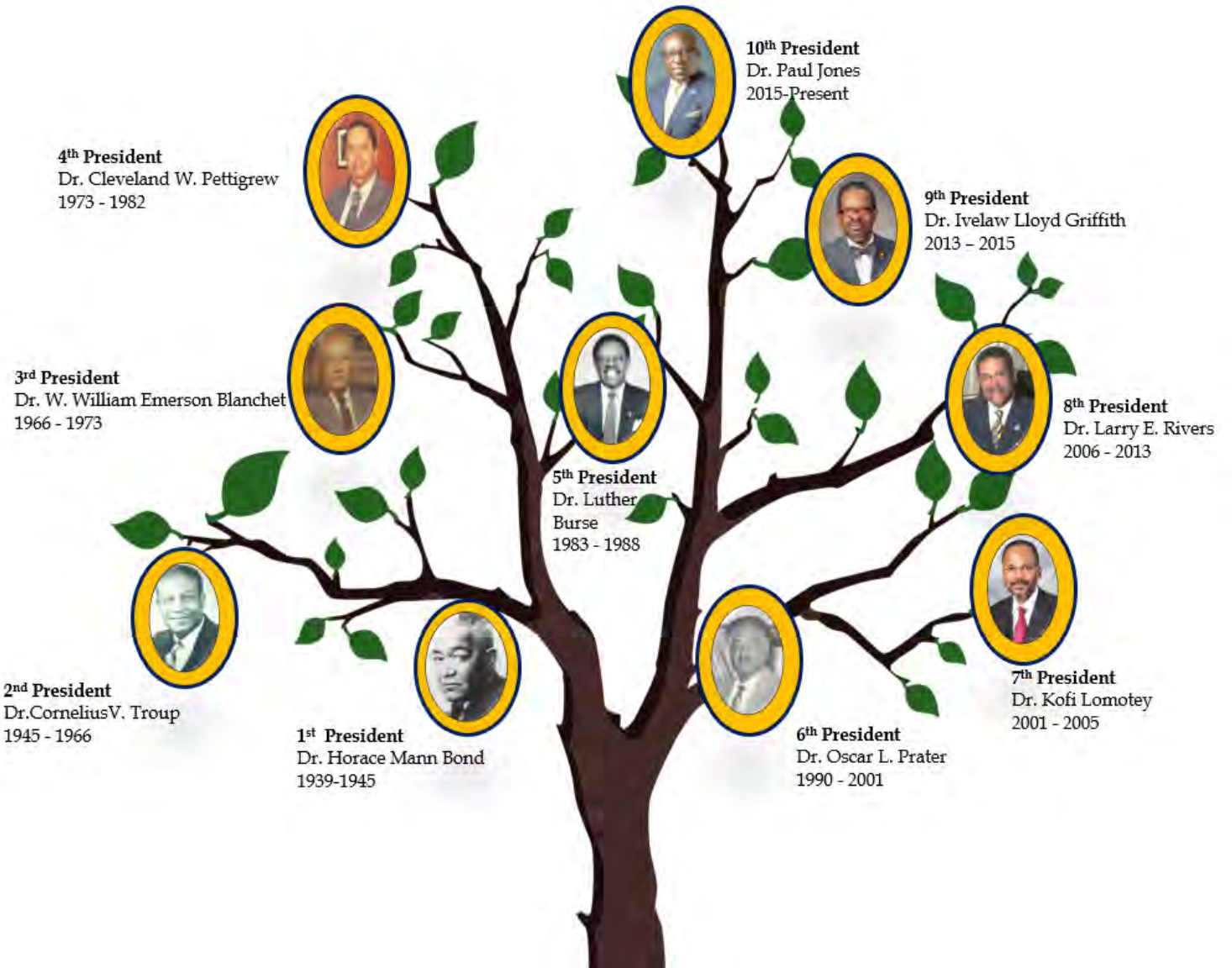

Figure 1: Fall 2018 Funnel Analysis

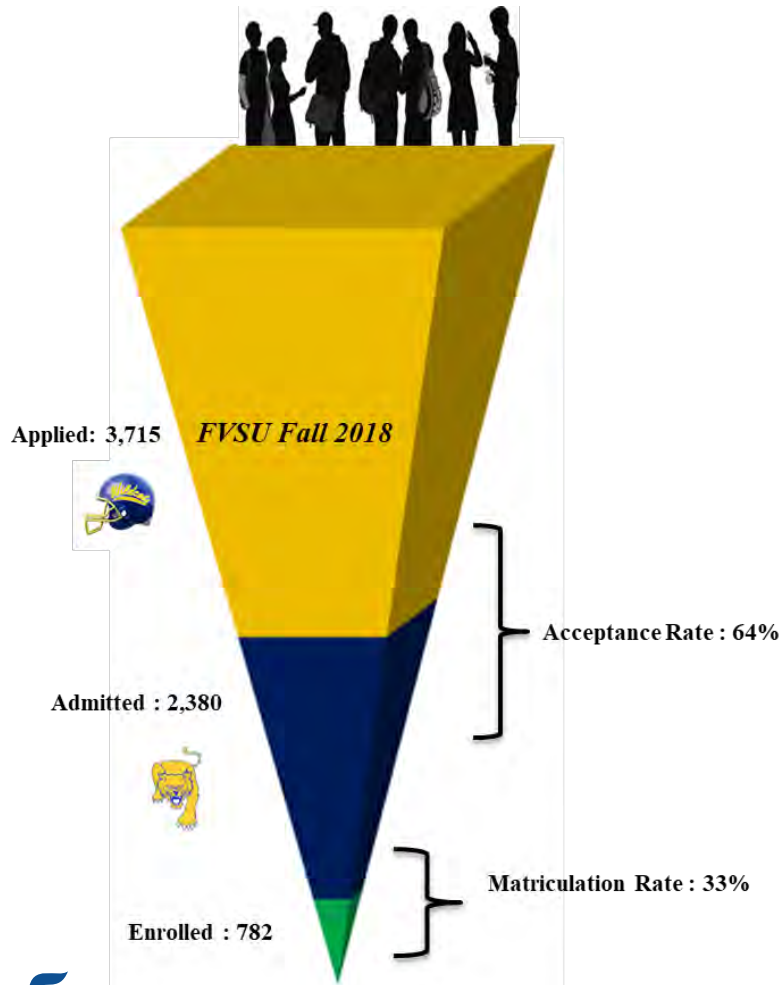
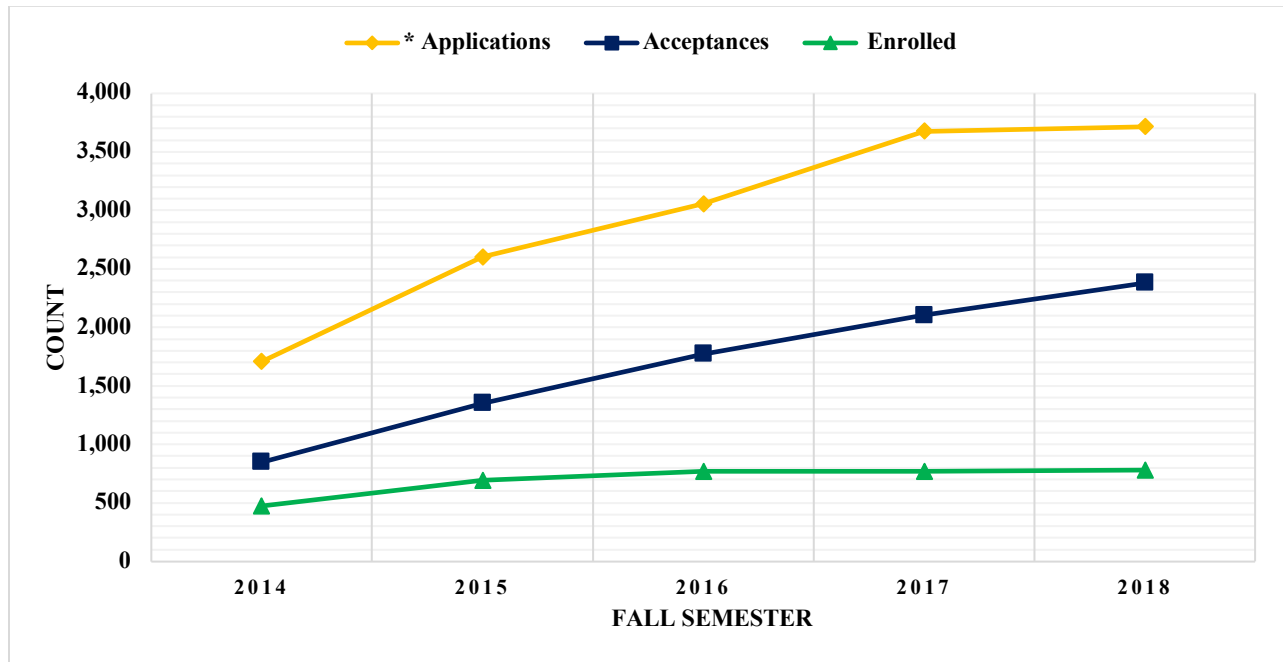

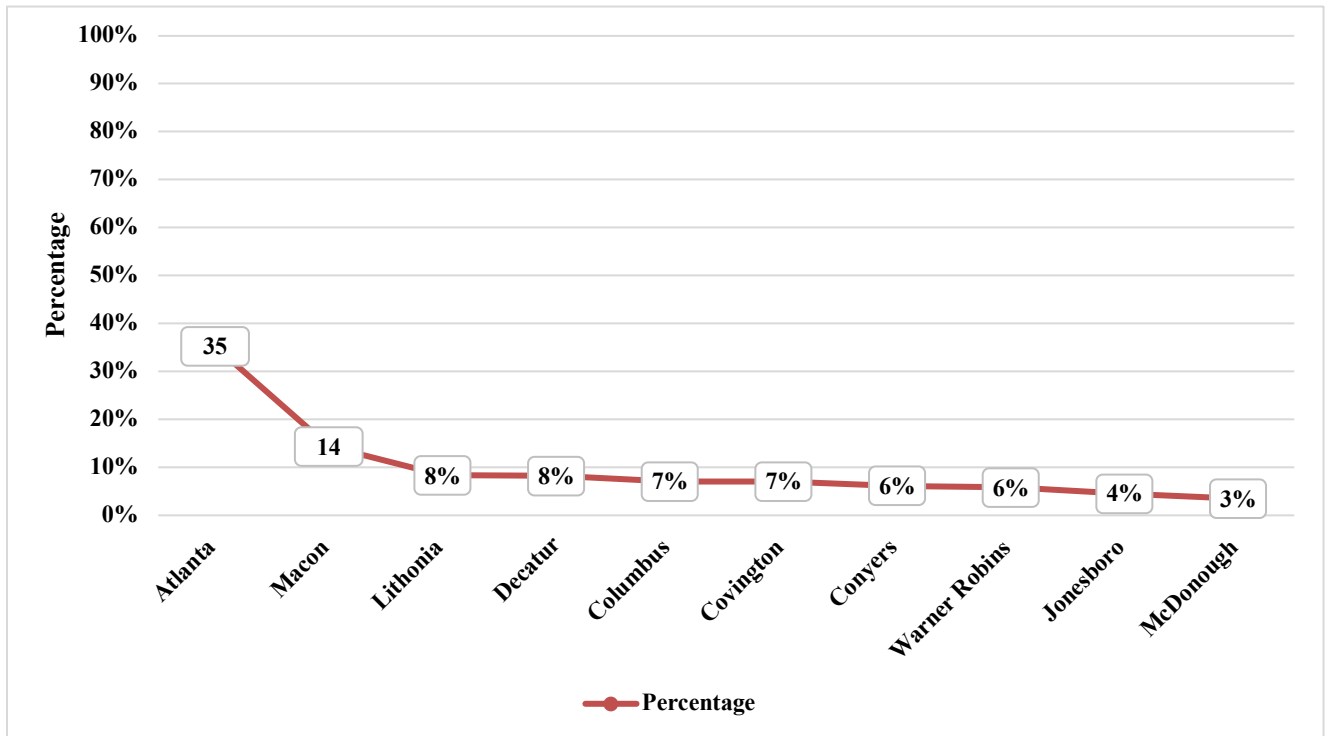

Figure 3: Fall 2018 Top 10 Cities by Applications

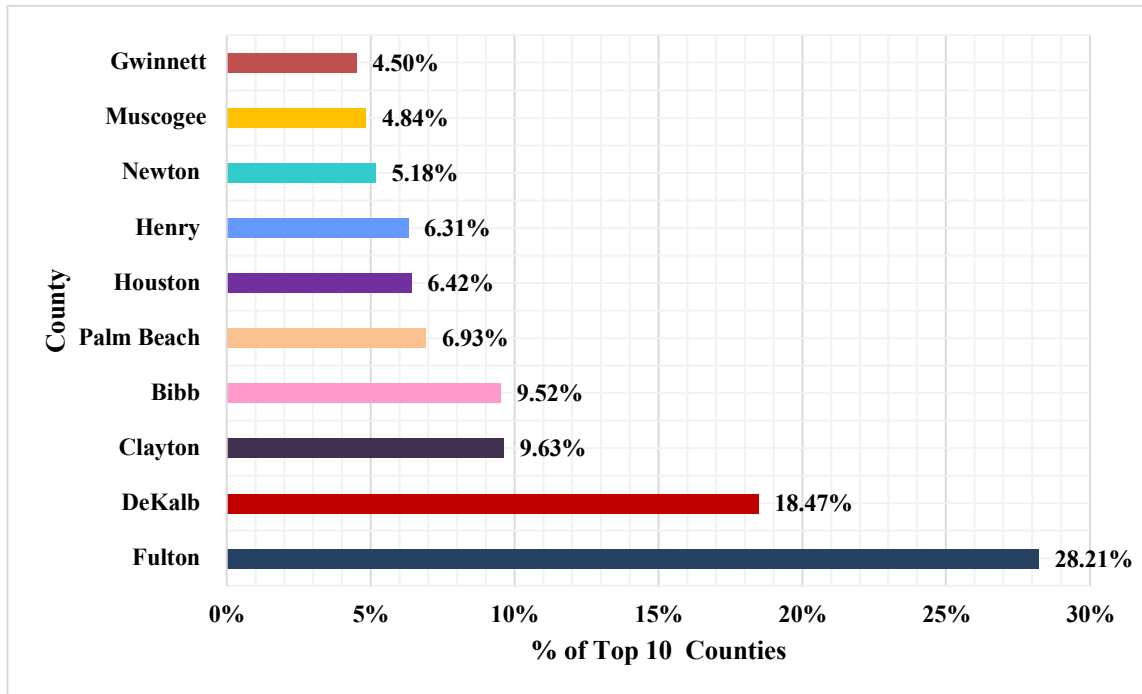

Figure 4: Fall 2018 Top 10 Counties by First-Time Freshmen Applications.

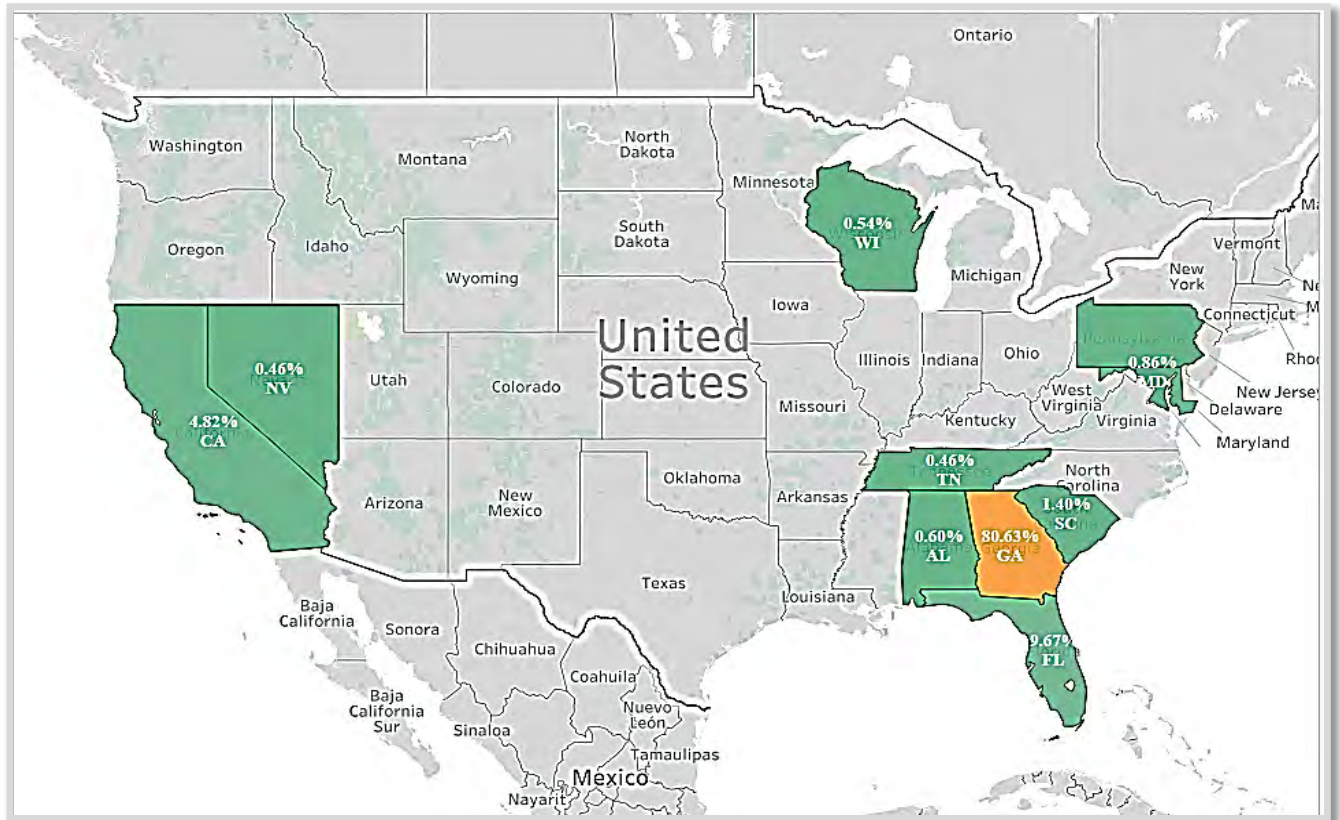

Figure 6: Fall 2014 - Fall 2018 Total Student Enrollment Trends

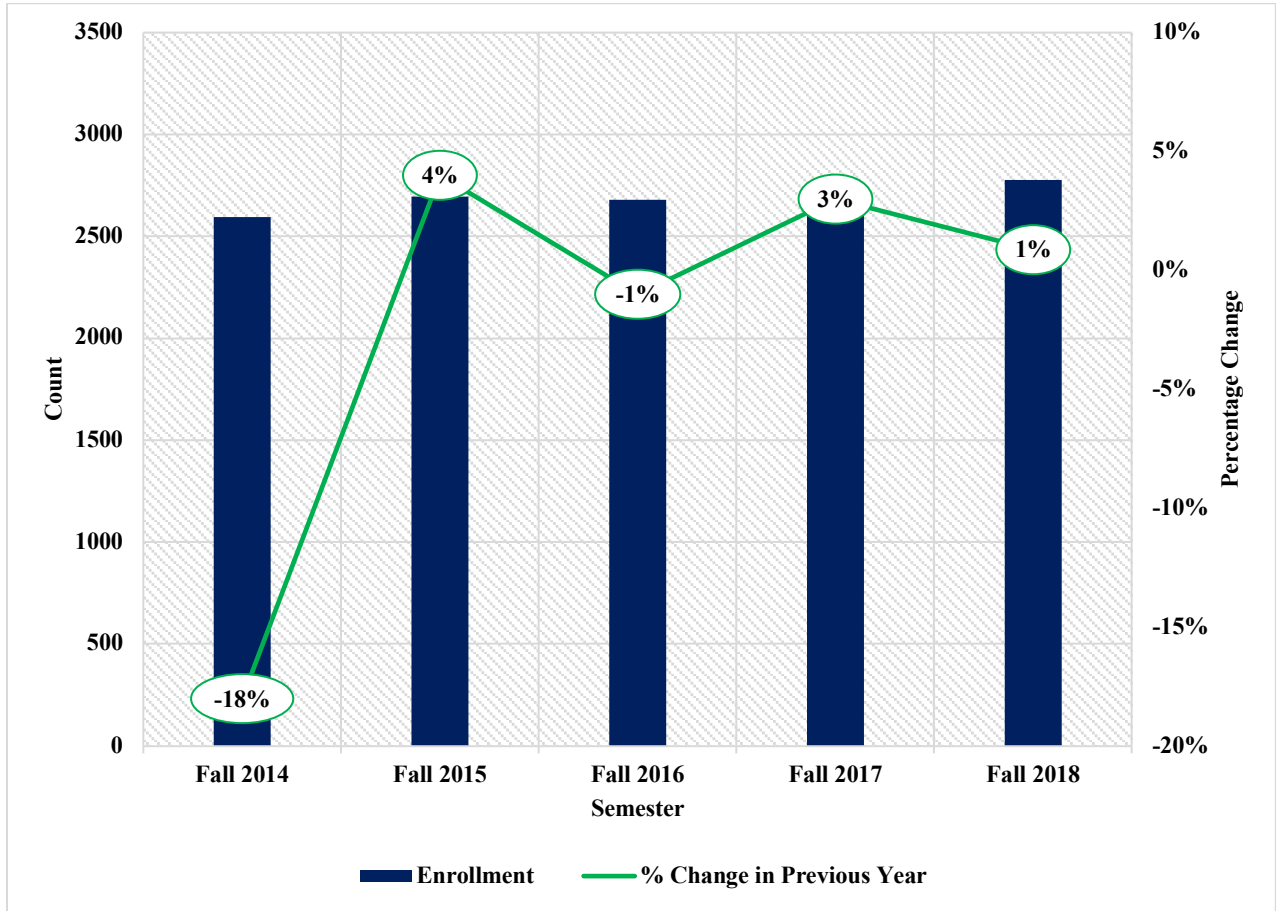

Figure 7: Fall 2014 - Fall 2018 Enrollment Trends by Gender

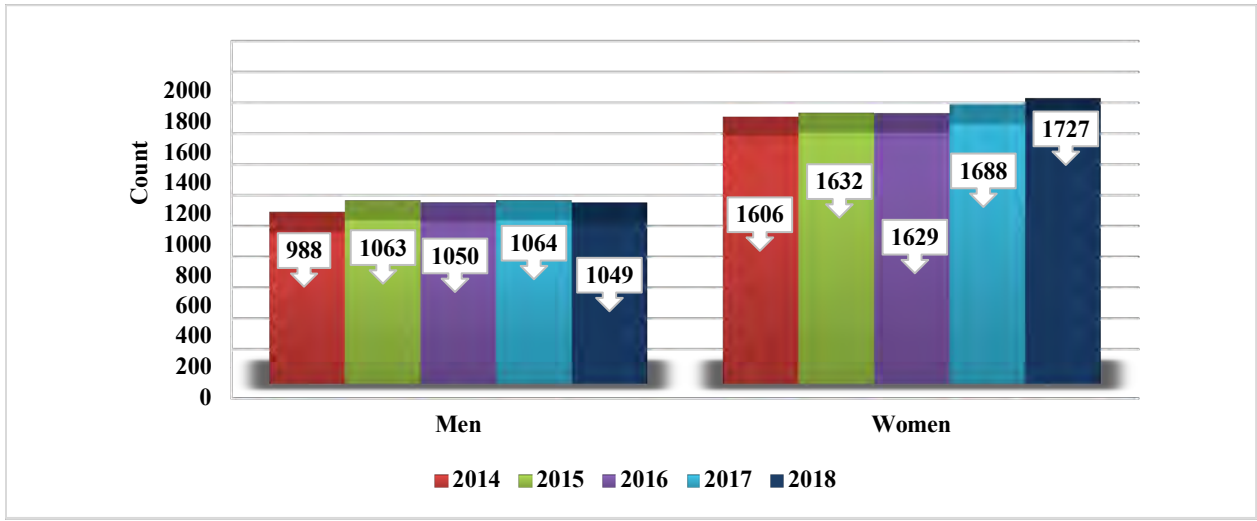
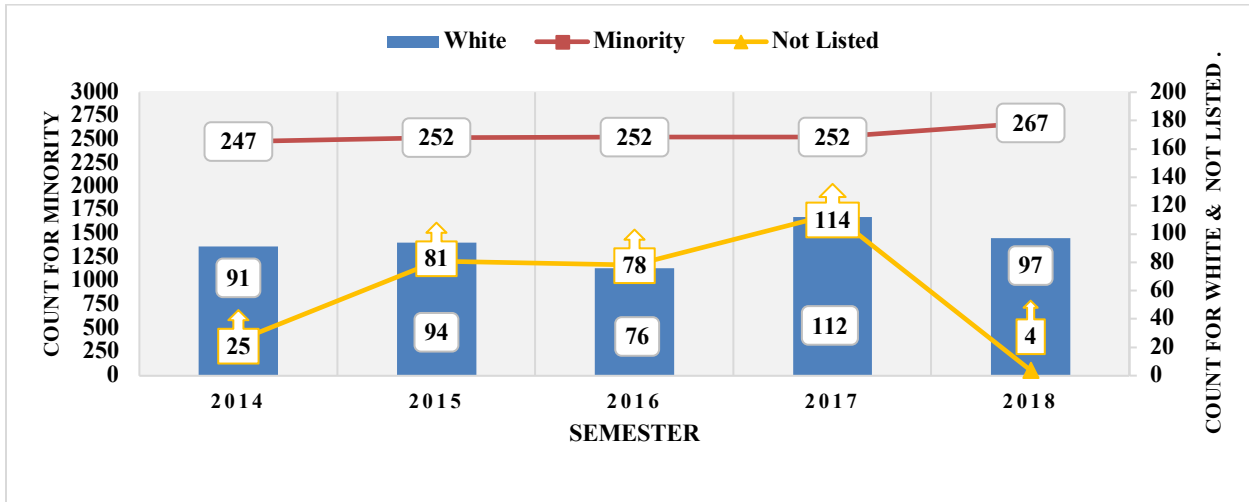


Figure 8: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 Enrollment by Minority and Non-Minority

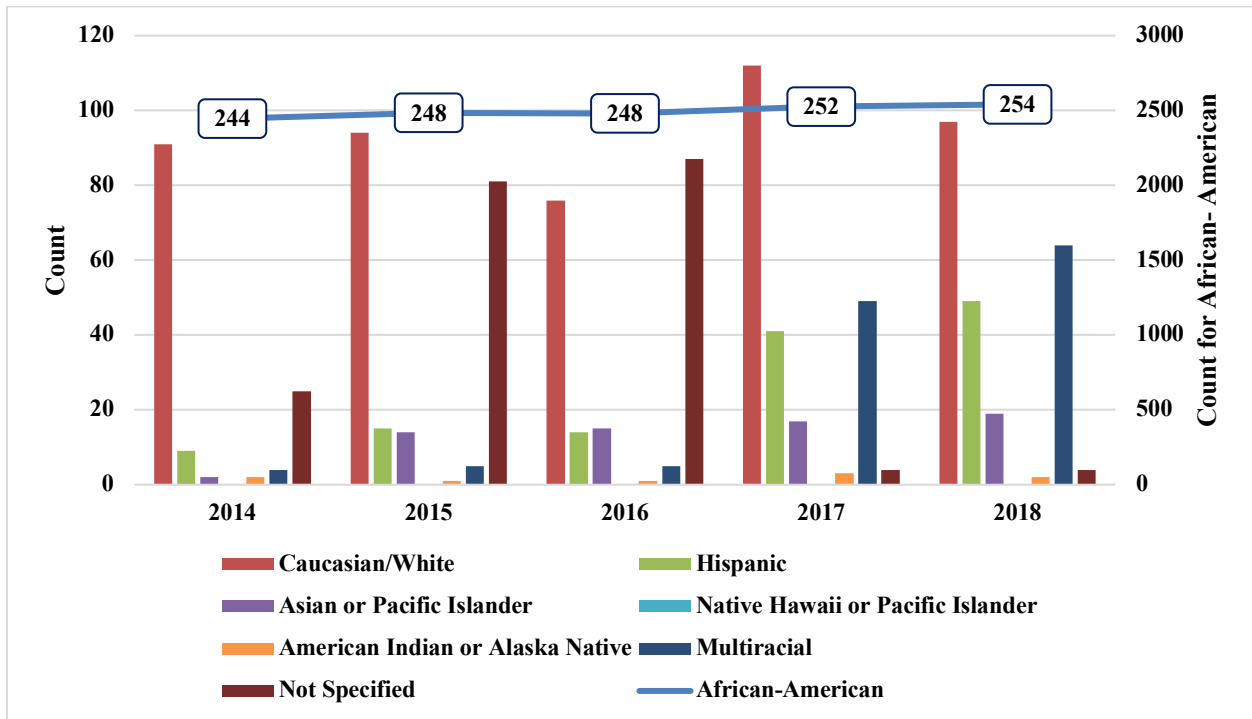

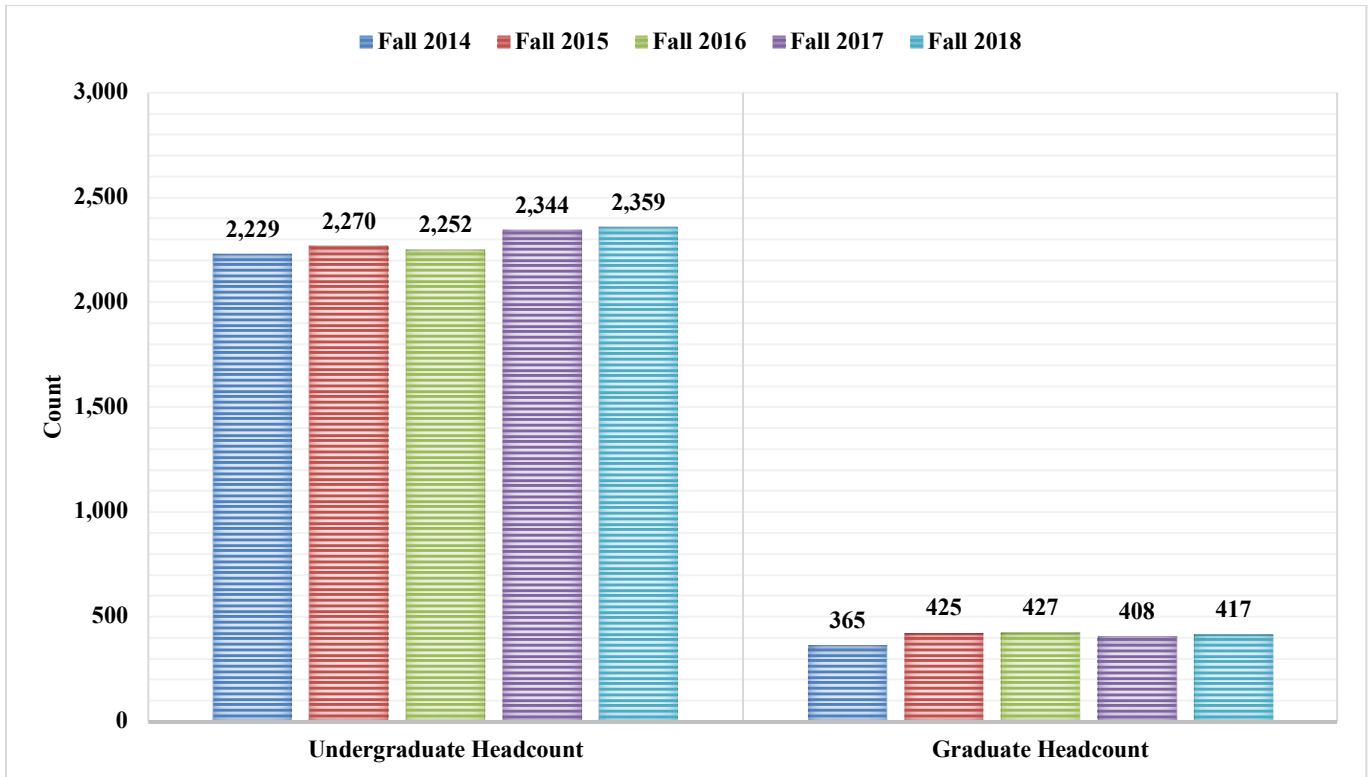

Figure 11: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 Student Enrollments by Status and Gender

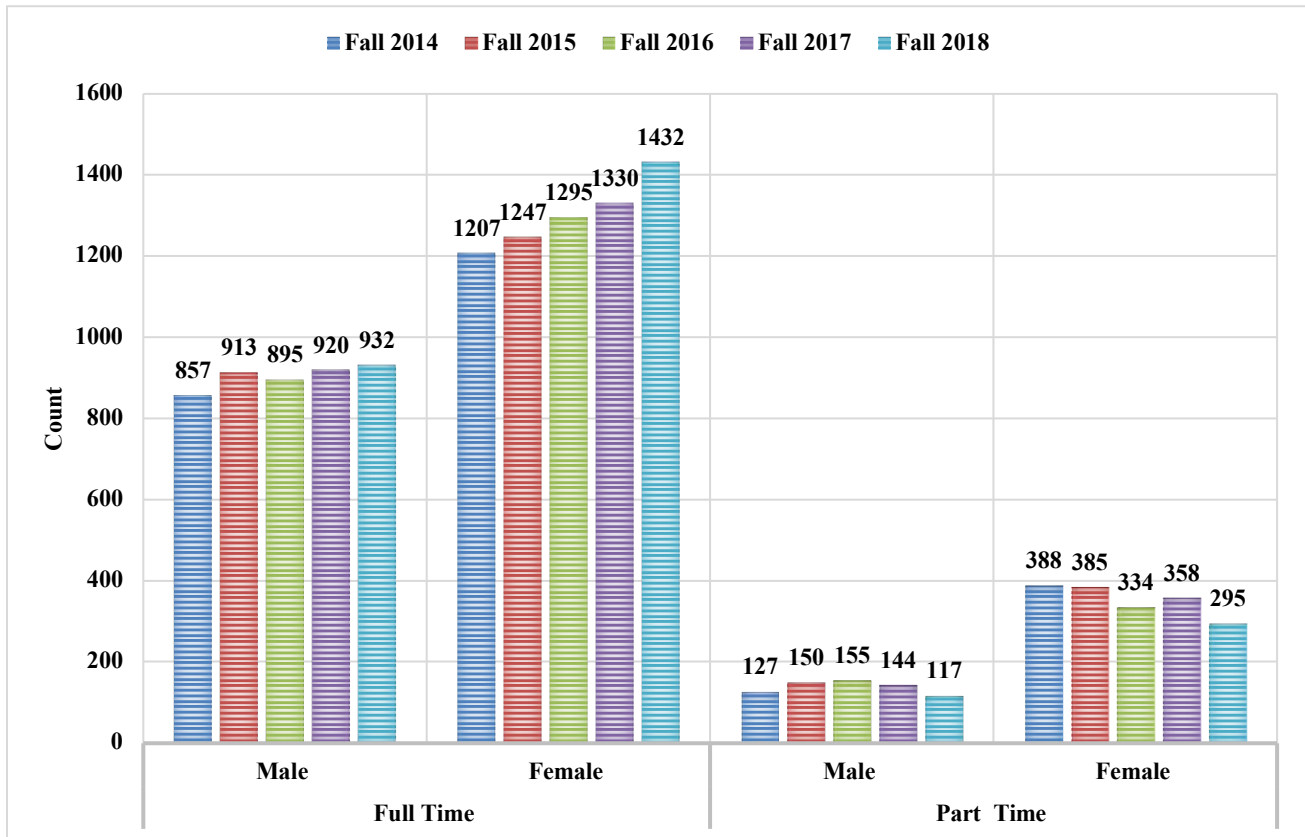
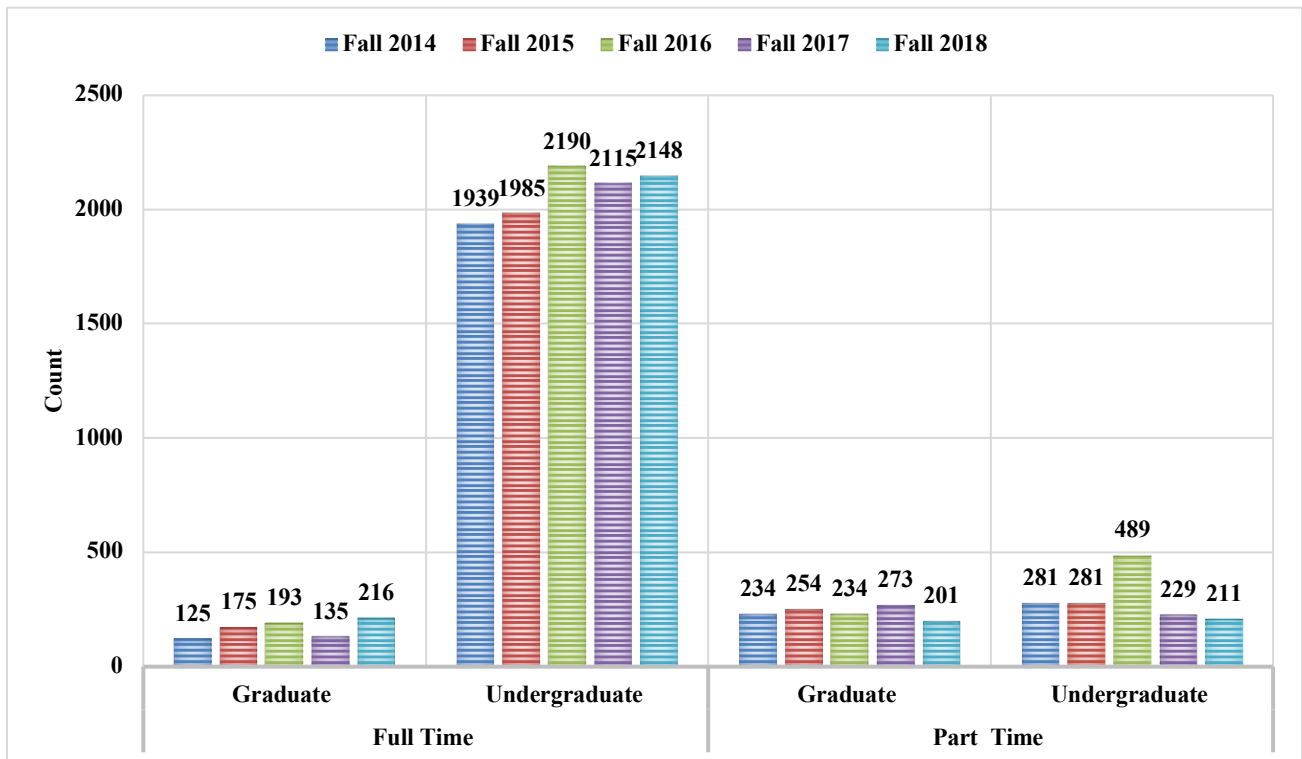

Figure 12: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 Student Enrollments by Status and Degree Level

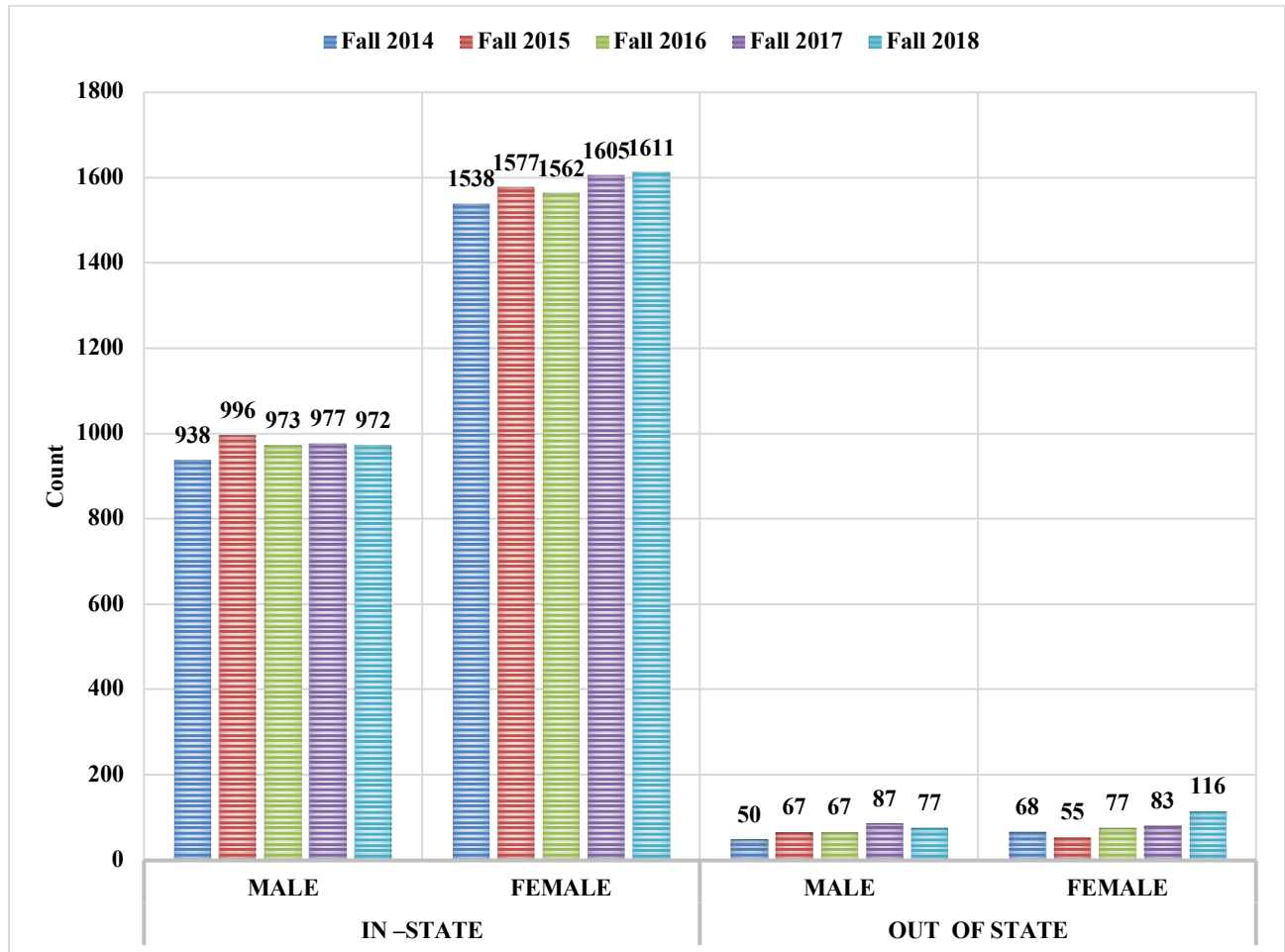

Figure 14: Enrollment Trends by Delivery Method

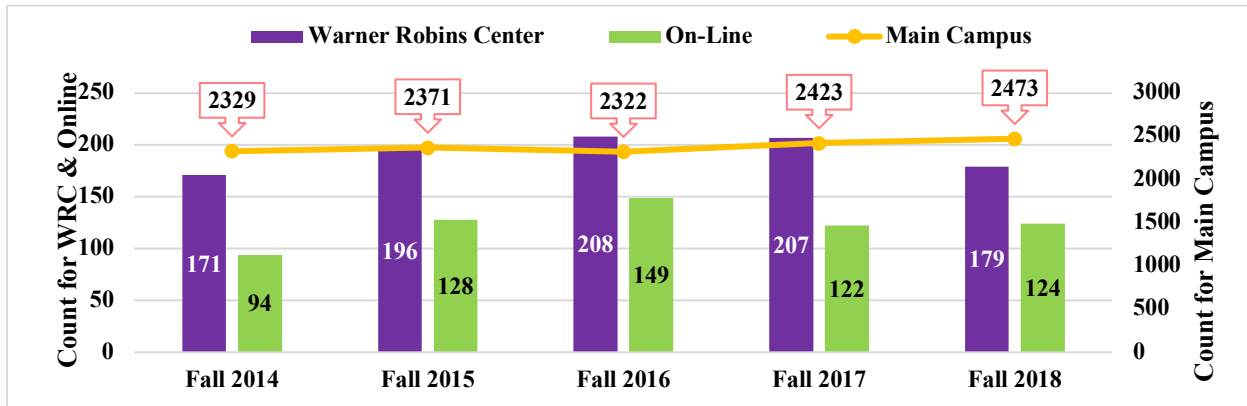
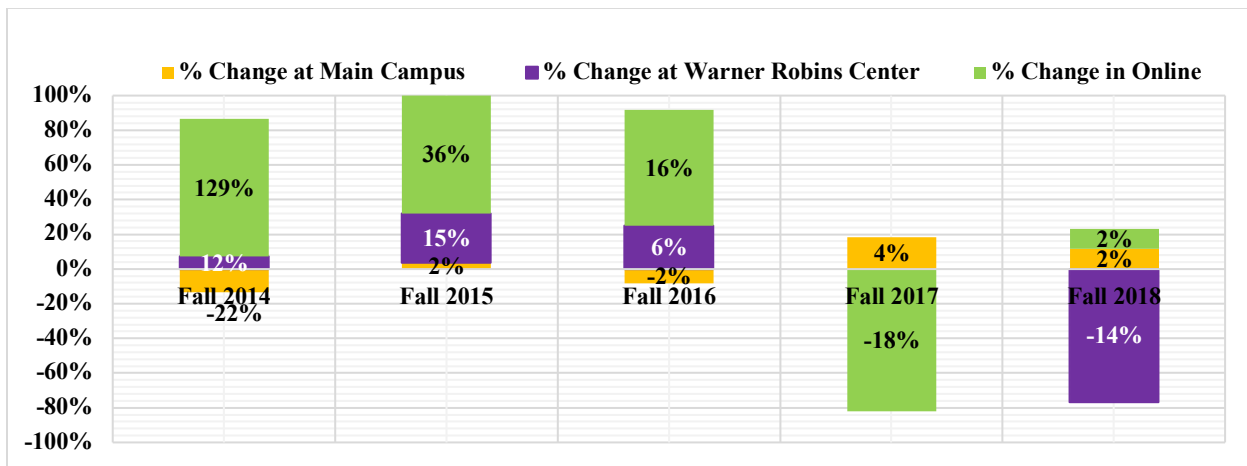


Figure 15: Enrollment Trends in Campus by Change in Percentage.

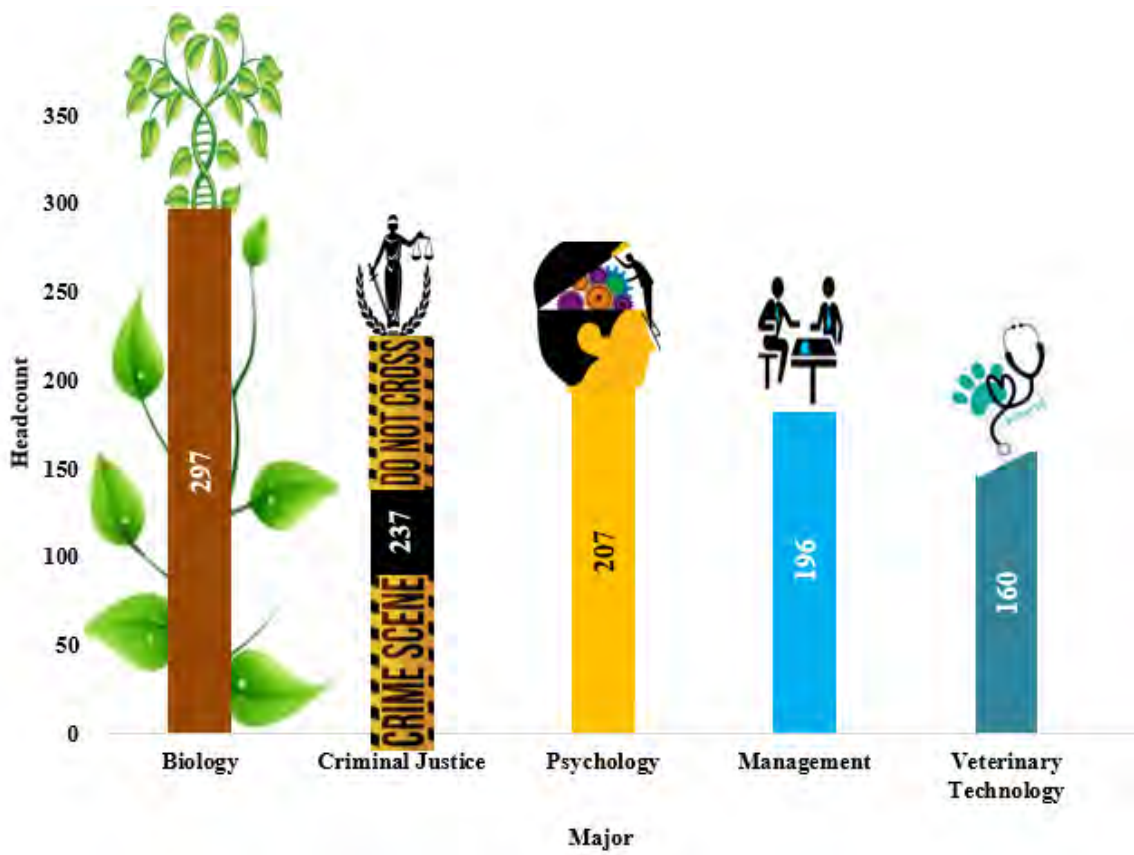

Figure 16: Fall 2018 Top 5 Majors at FVSU



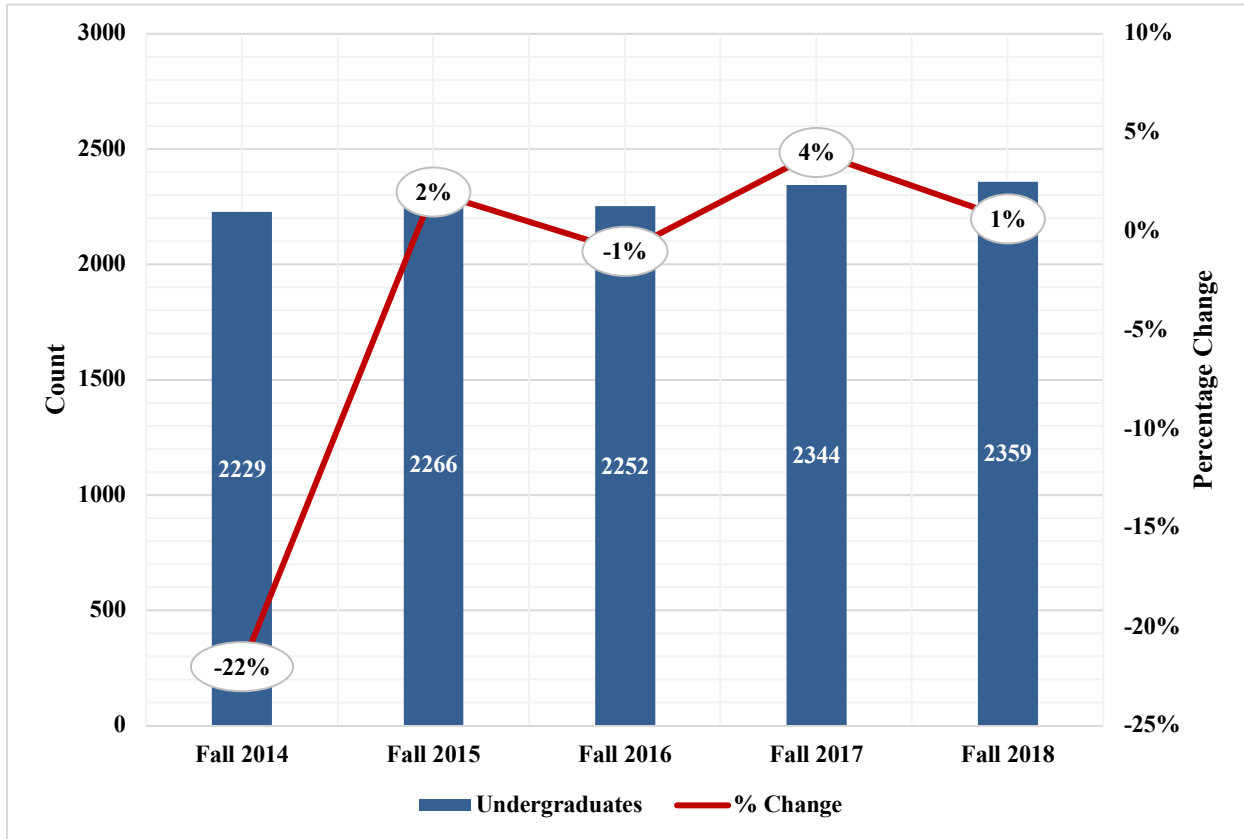

Figure 18: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 Undergraduate Enrollment Fall by Classification

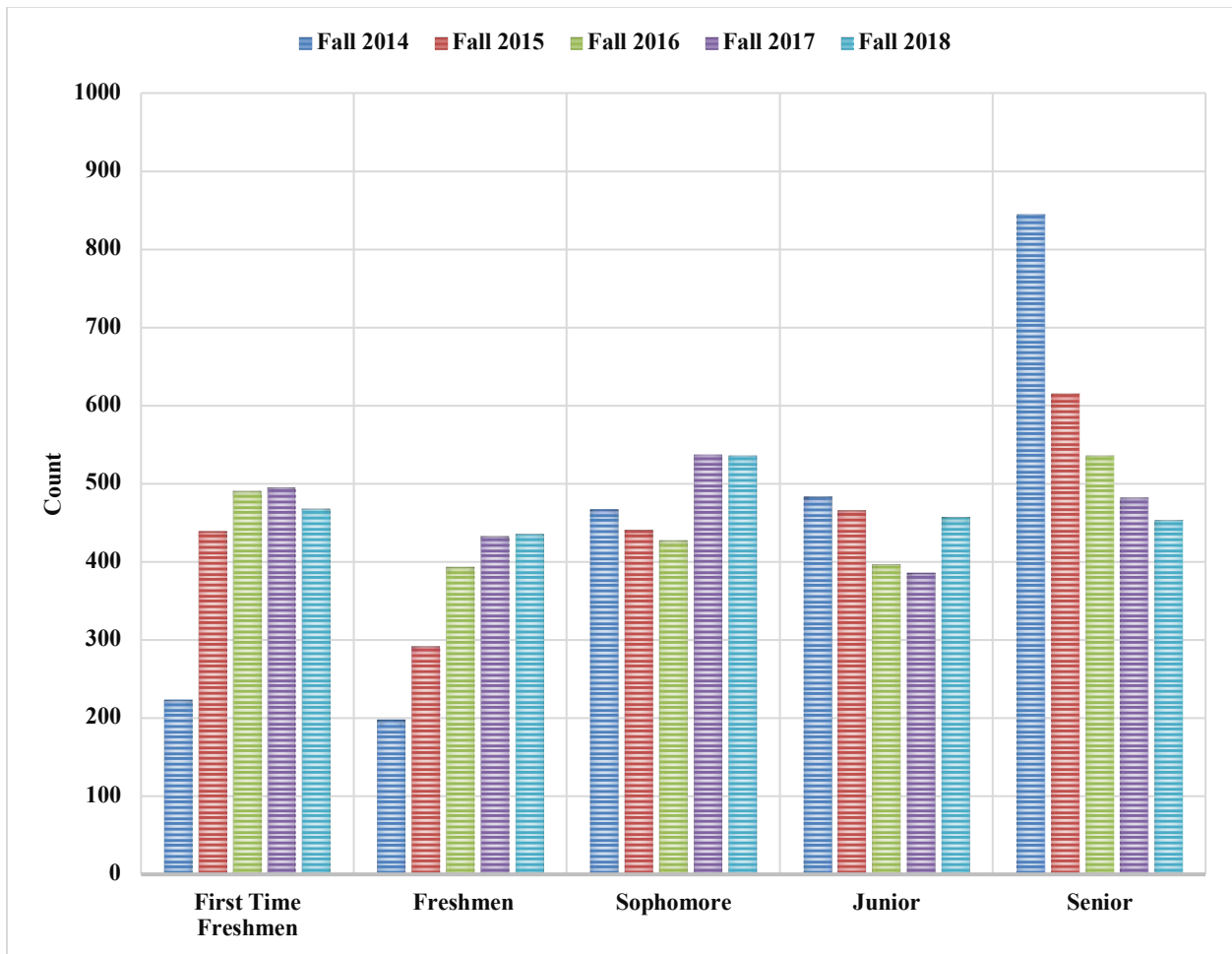

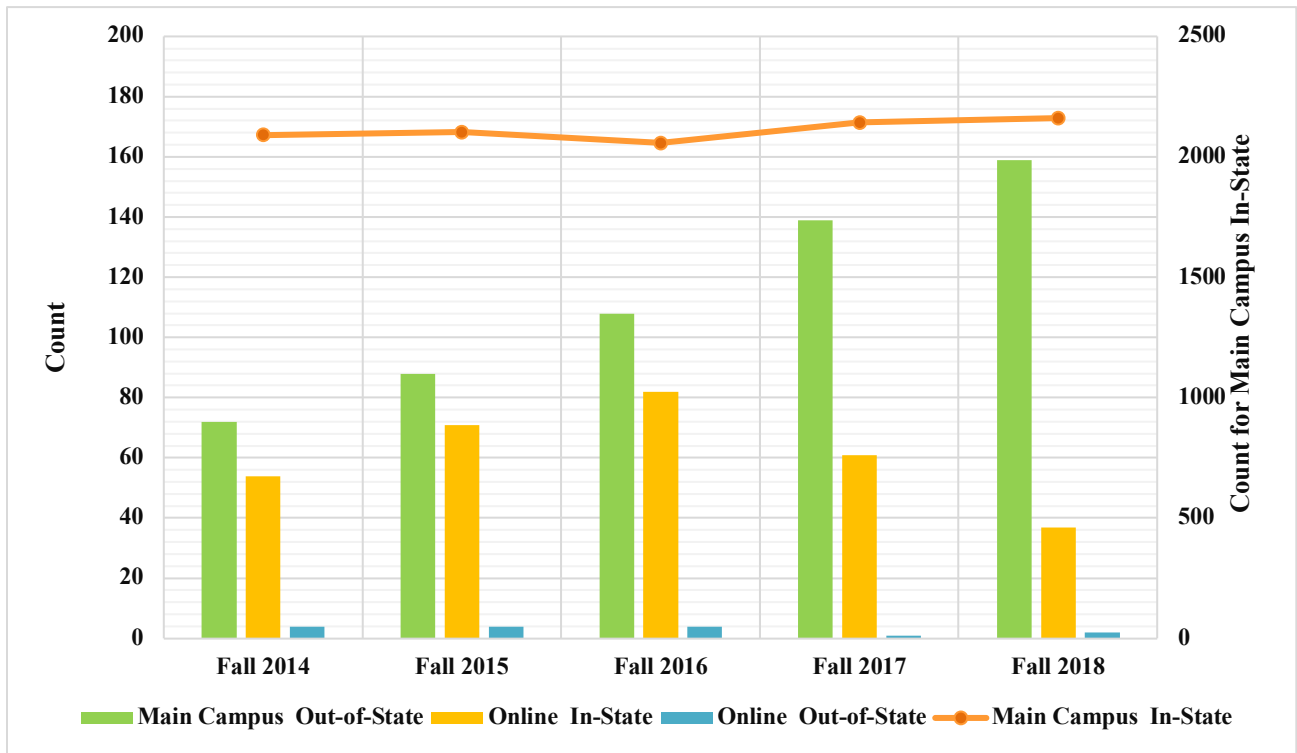

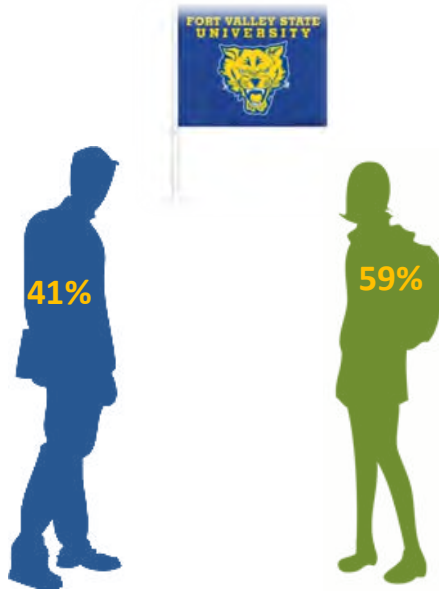

Figure 20: Fall 2018 First-Time Freshmen Enrollment by Gender

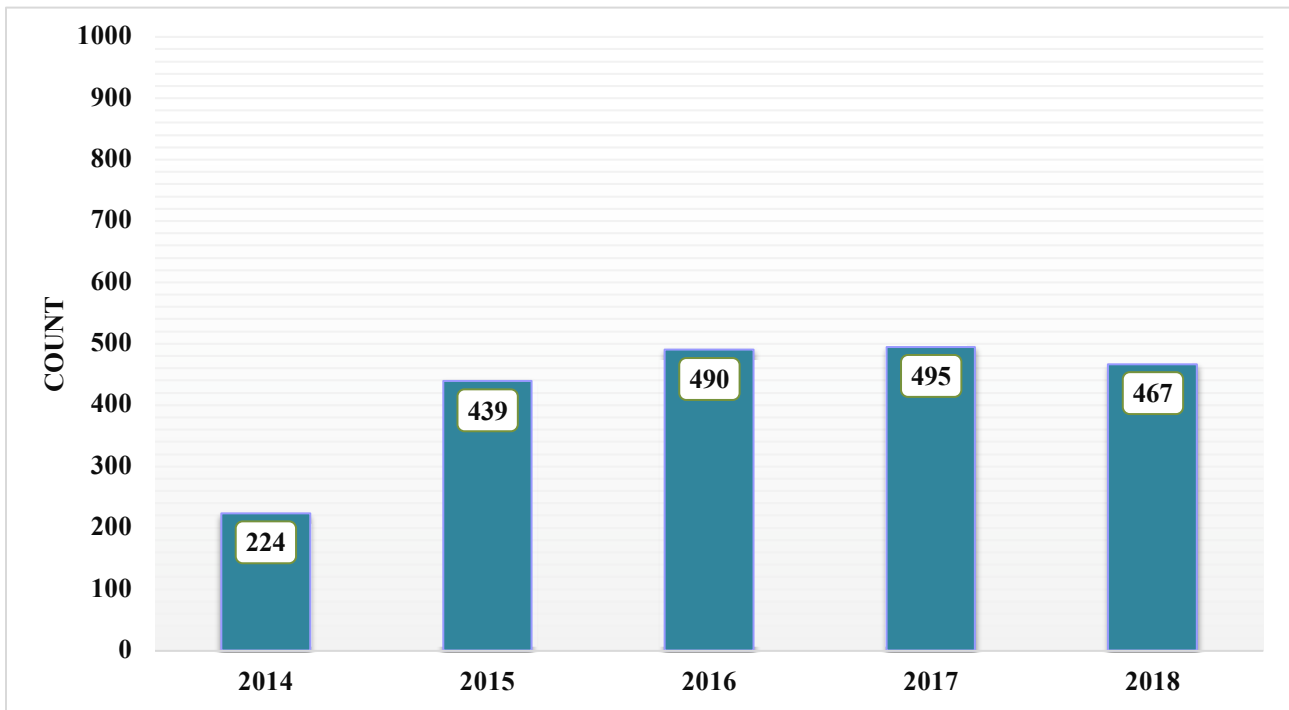

Figure 21: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 First-Time Freshmen Enrollment by Gender

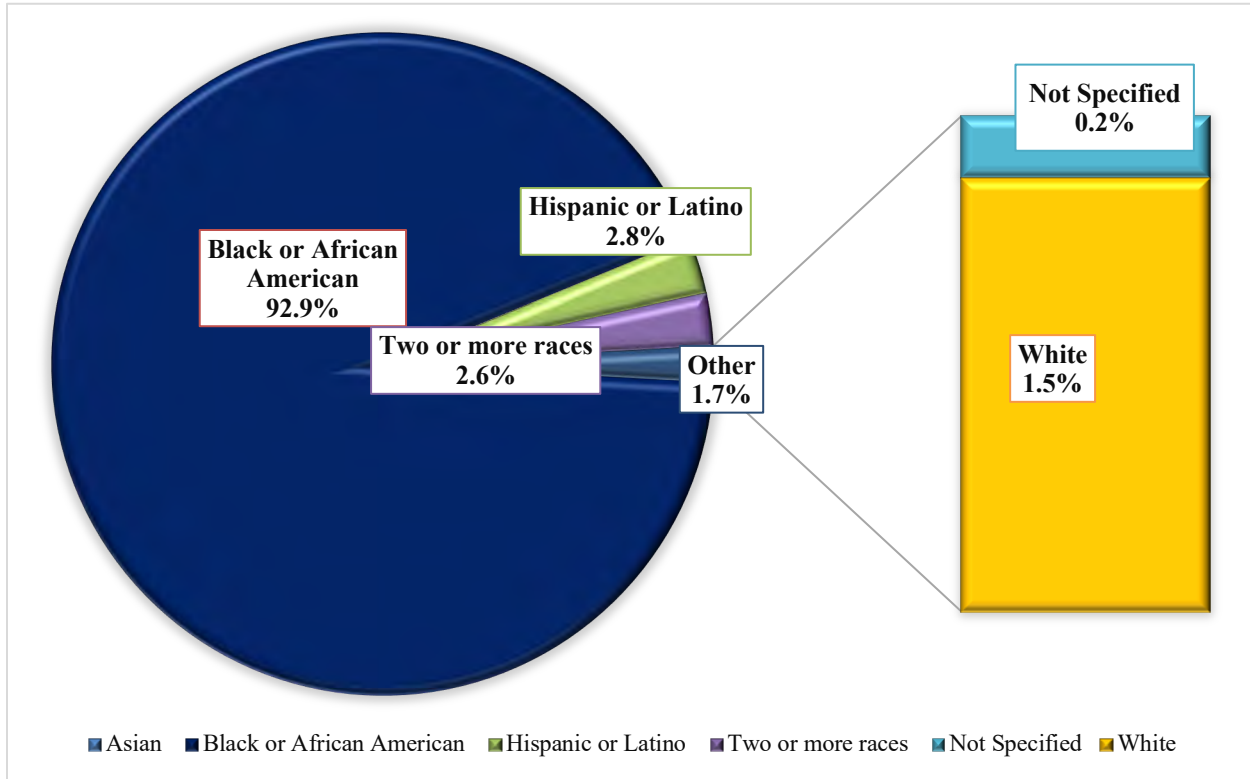

Figure 22: Fall 2018 First-Time Freshmen Enrollment by Ethnicity

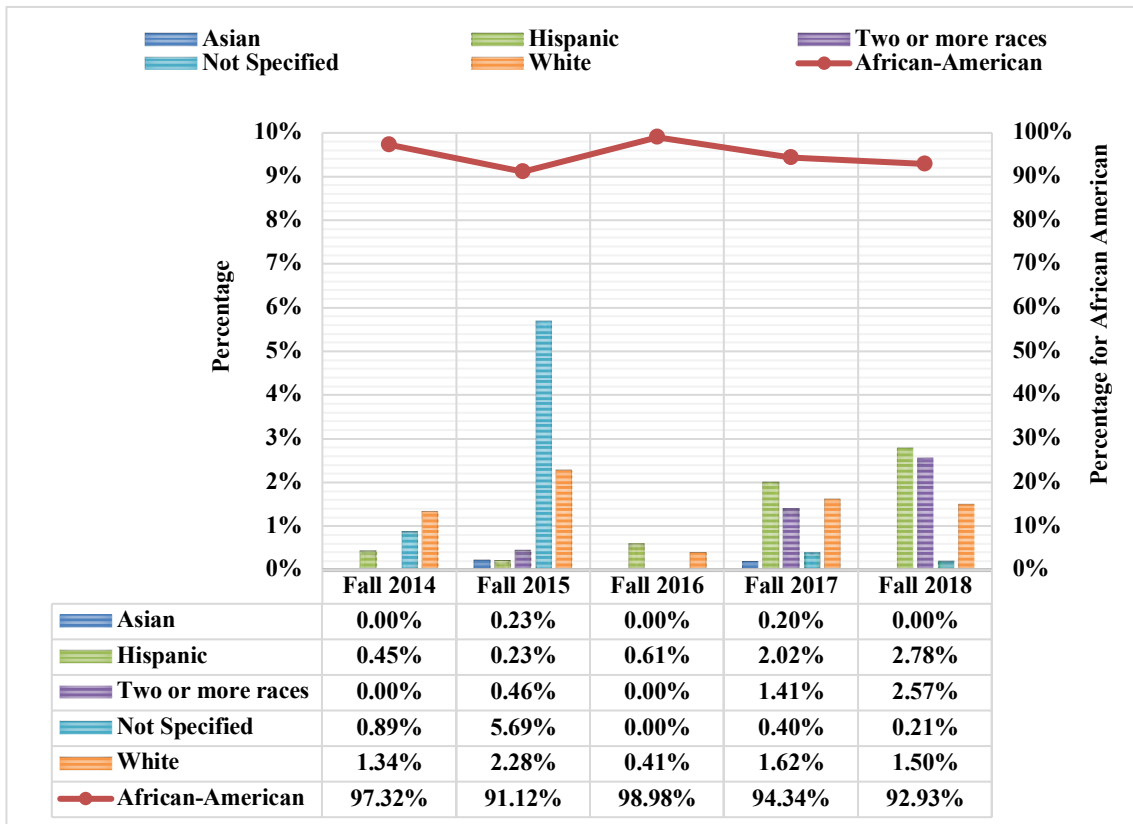

Figure 23: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 First-time Freshmen Enrollment by Ethnicity

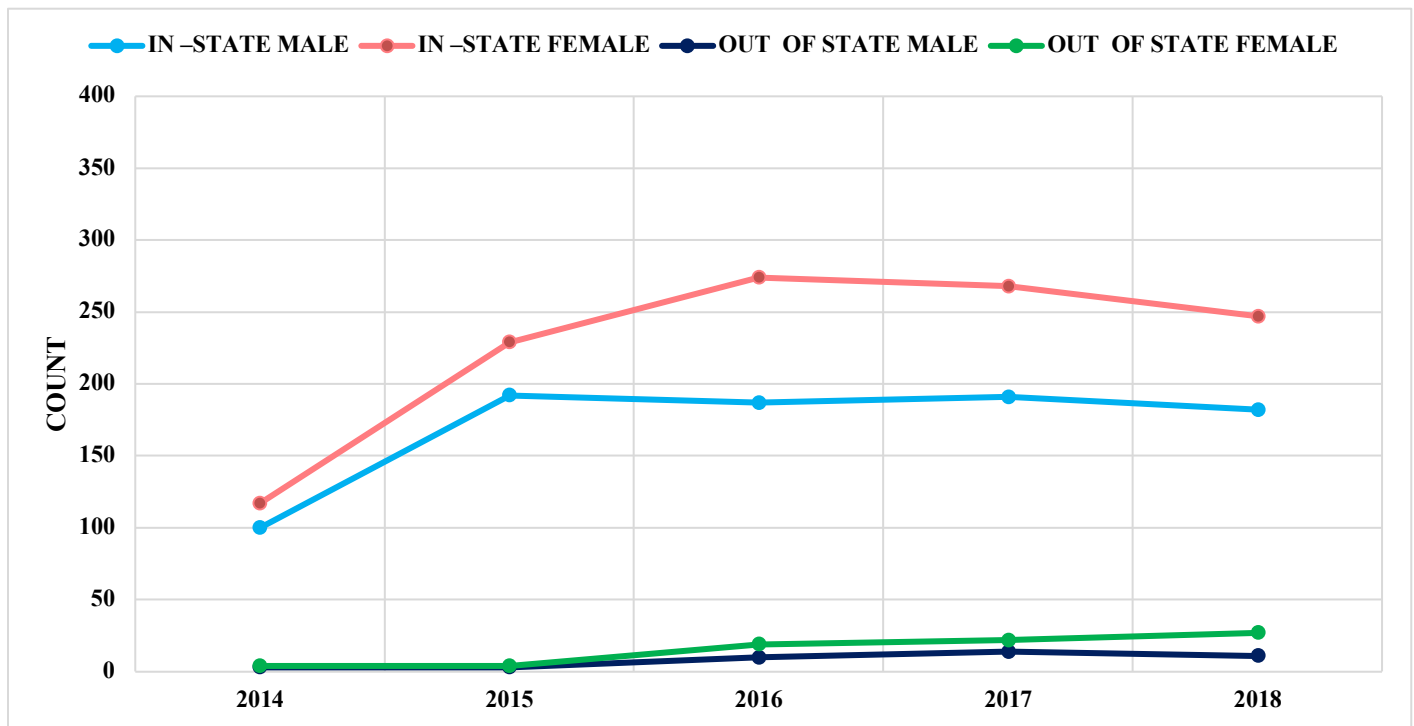

Figure 25: Fall 2018 Freshmen Enrollment by State of Origin

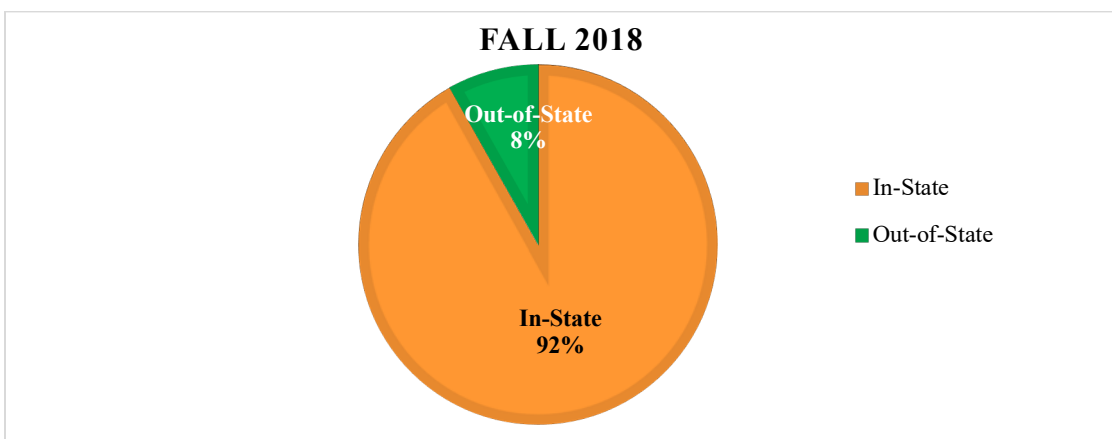
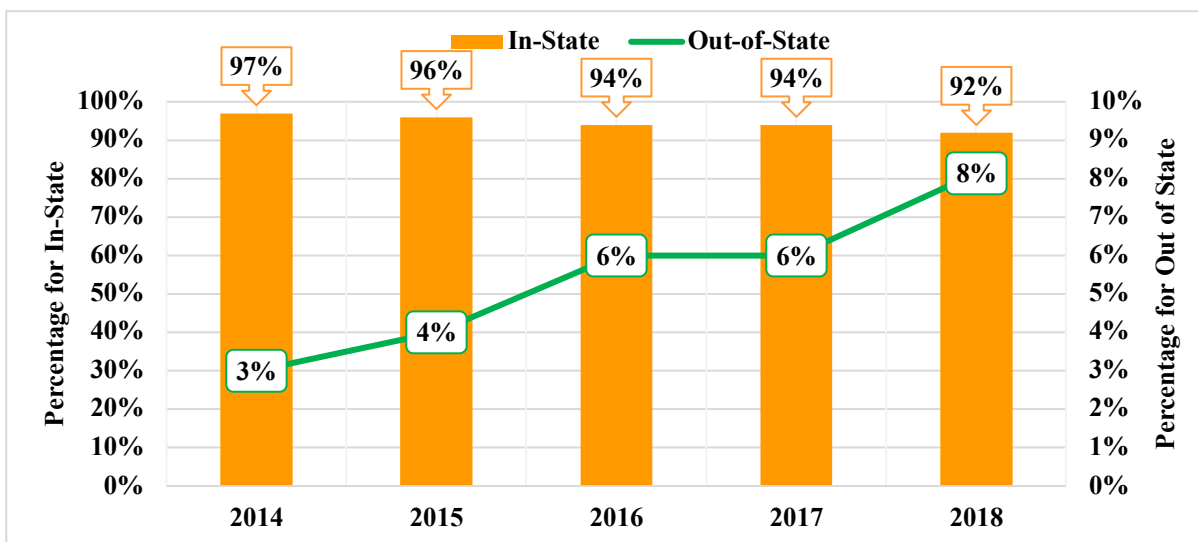


Figure 26: Fall 2014 -2018 First-Time Freshmen Enrollment by State of Origin

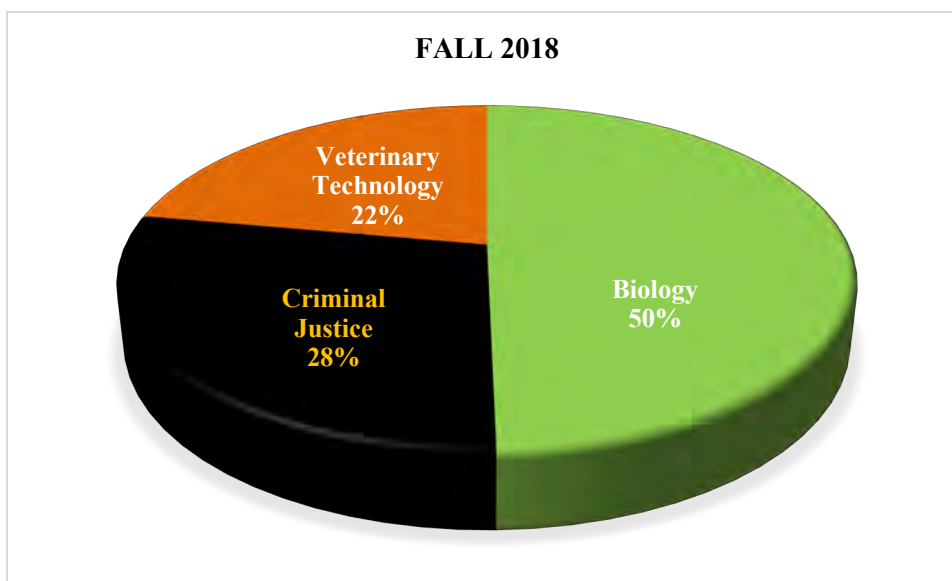

Figure 27: Fall 2018 Top 3 Majors by First-Time Freshmen

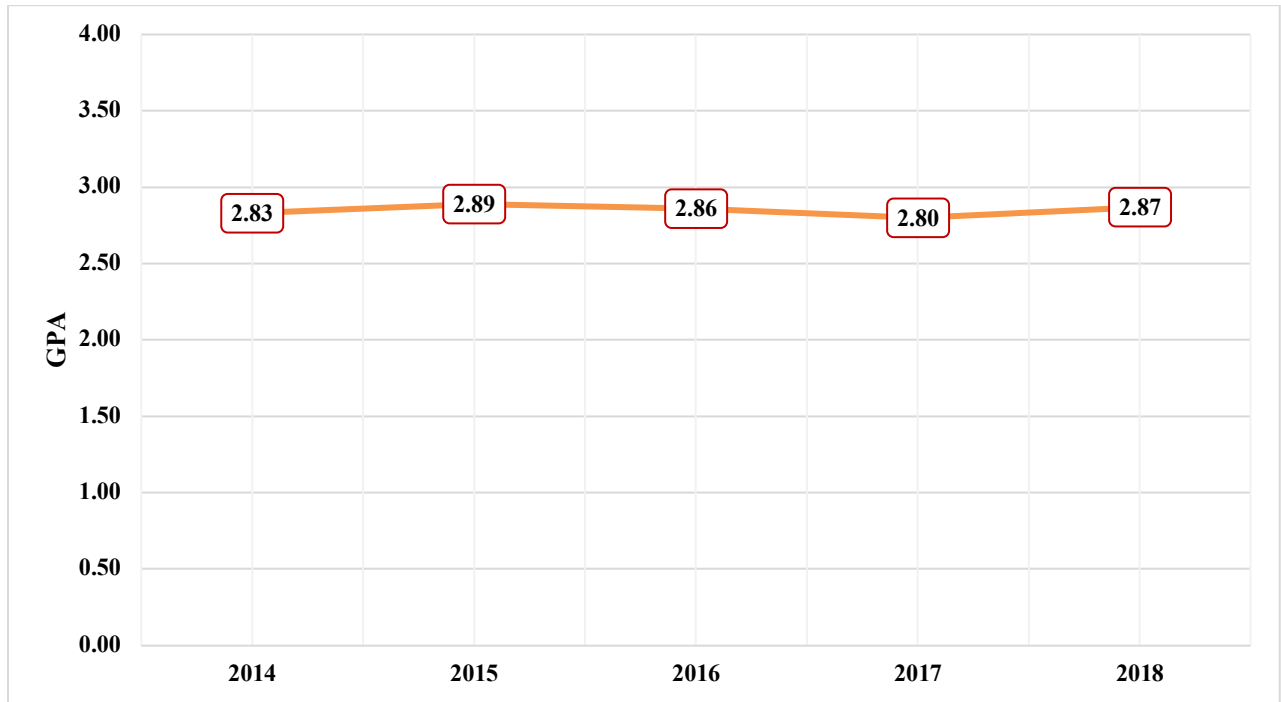

Figure 28: First-Time Freshmen High School GPA Trends

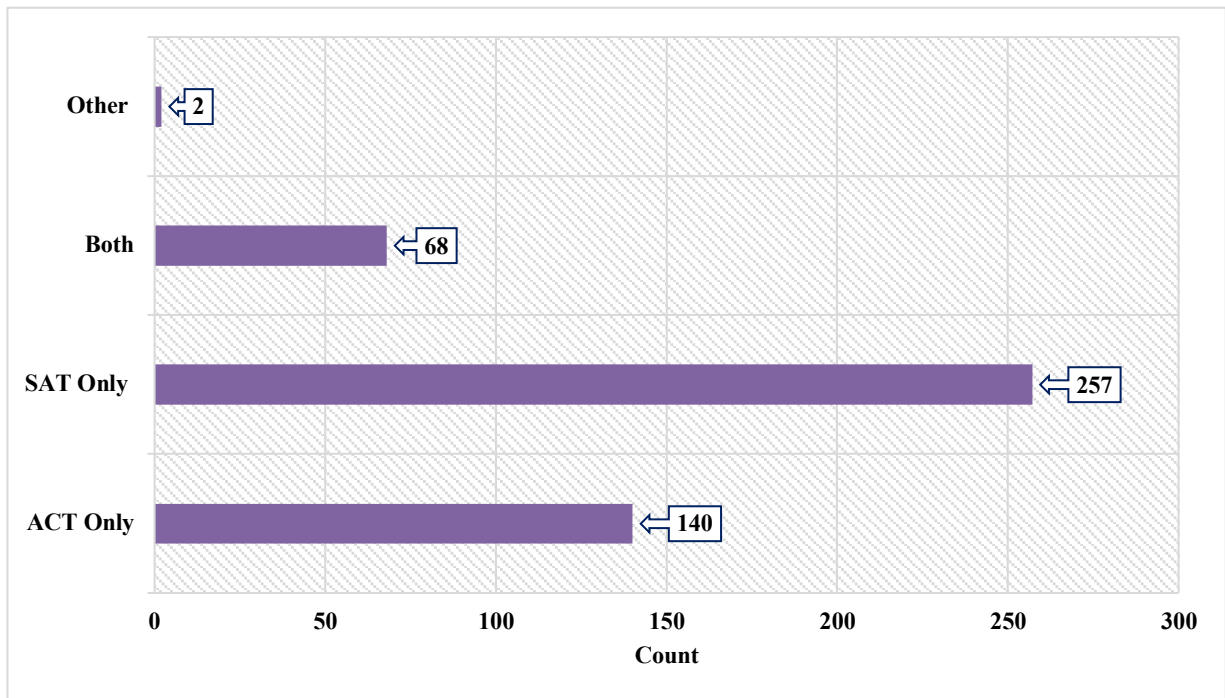

Figure 30: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 First-Time Freshmen by Mean ACT Scores

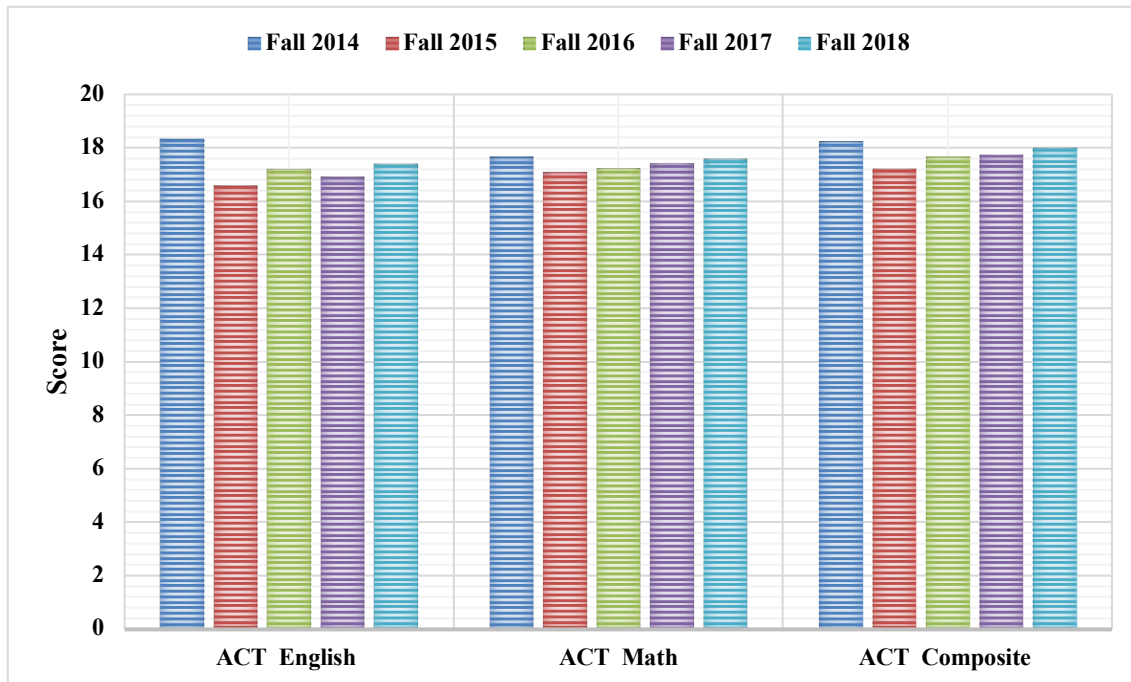
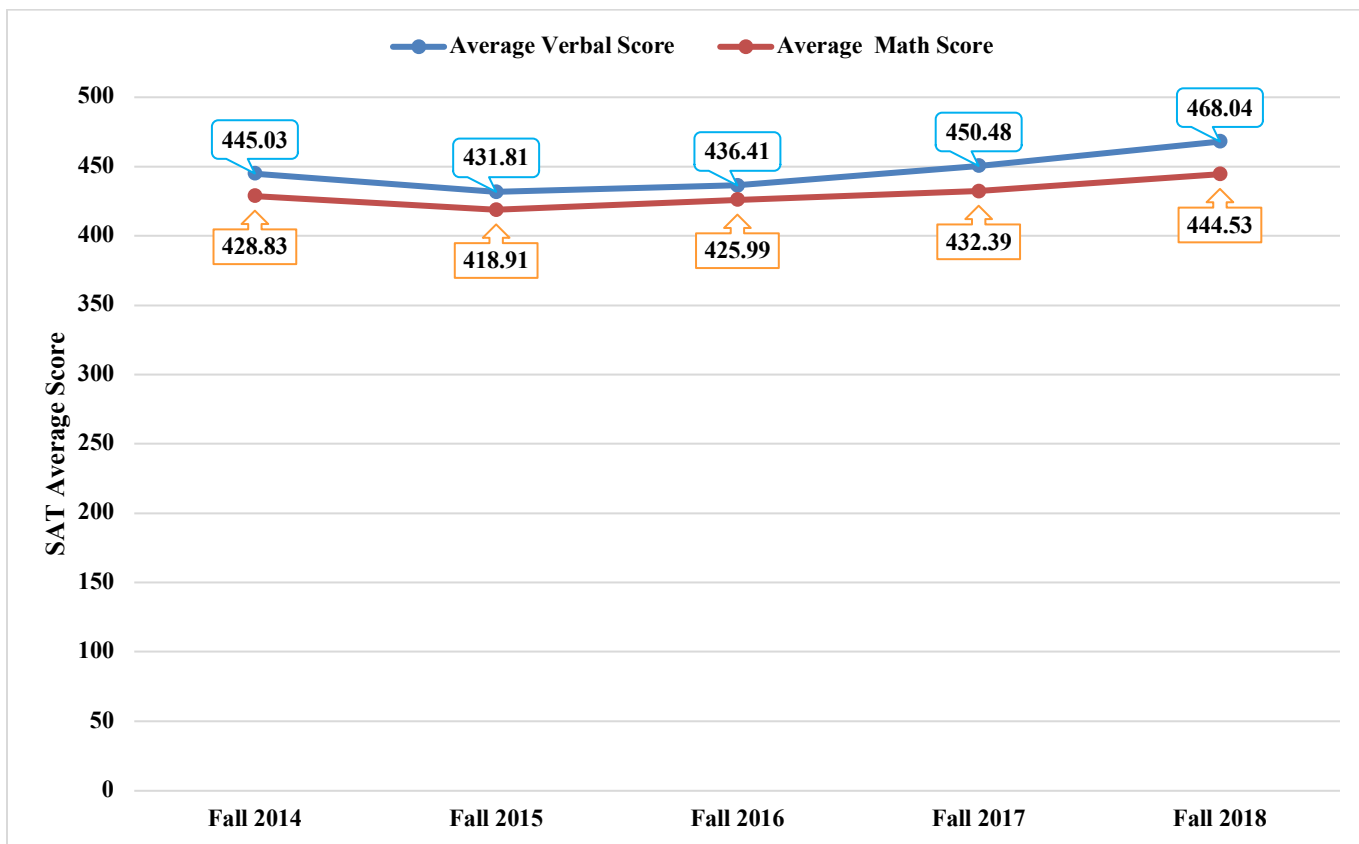

Figure 31: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 First-Time Freshmen by Average SAT Scores



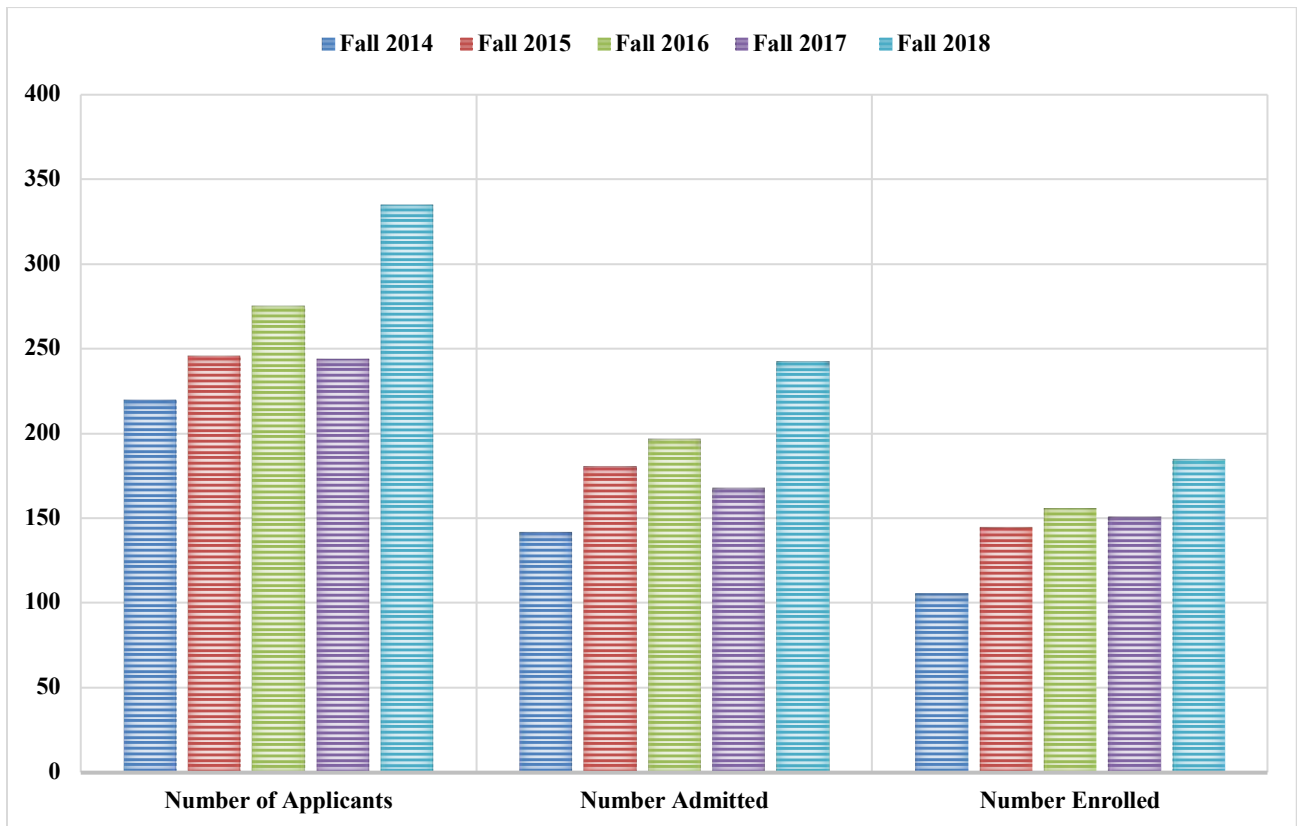

Figure 32: Fall 2014-2018 Transfer Student Applied, Admitted and Enrollment



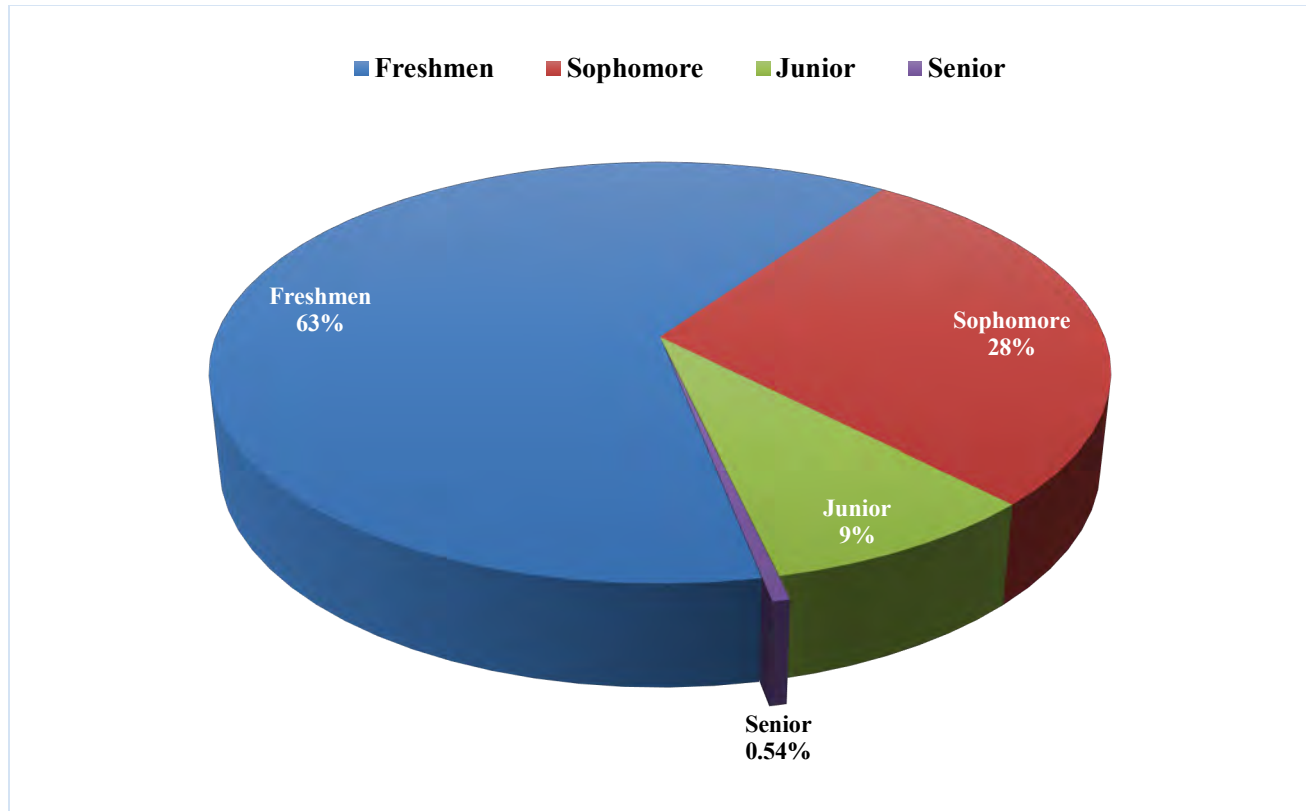

Figure 33: Fall 2018 Transfer Student Enrollment by Classification



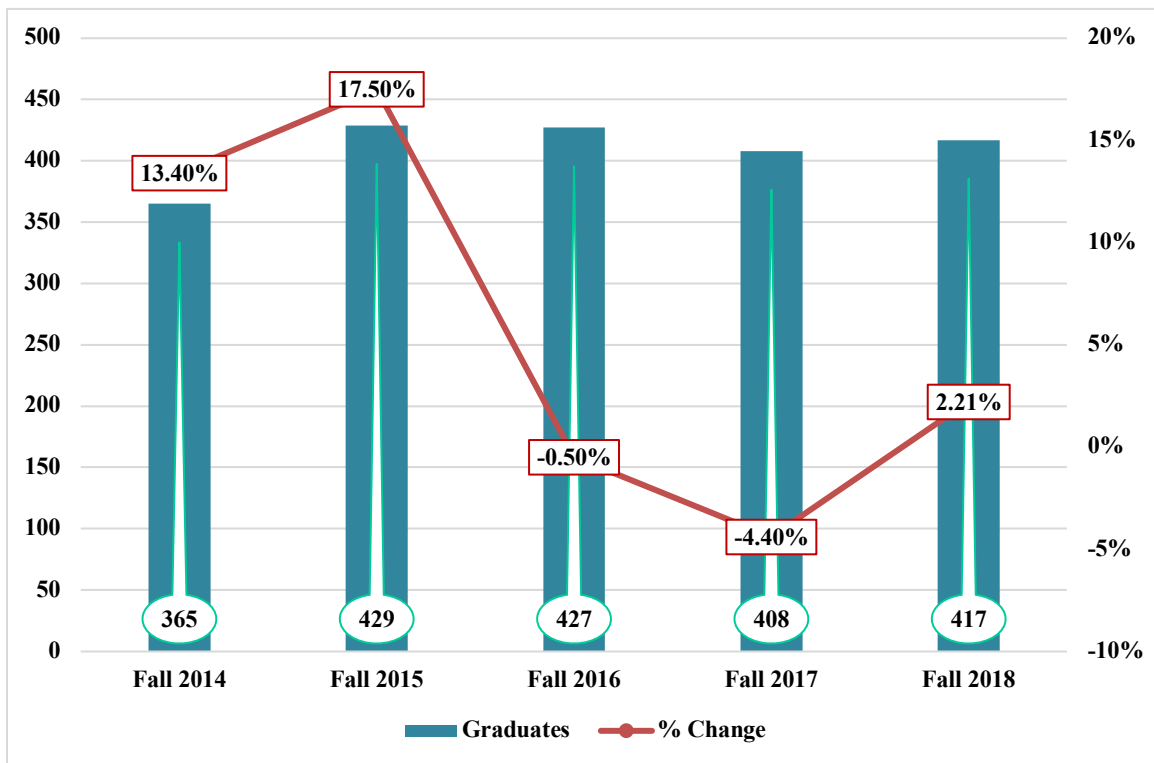

Figure 34: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 Graduate Student Enrollment

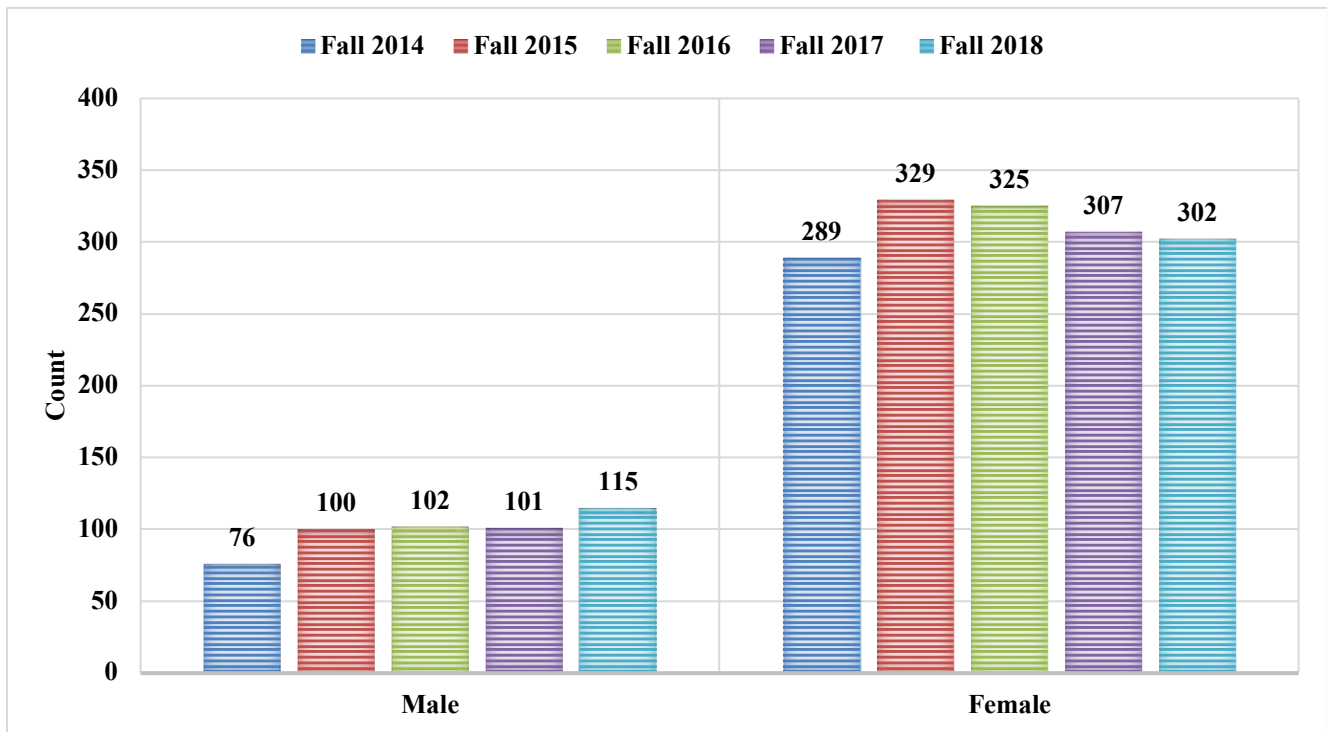

Figure 35: Fall 2014 - Fall 2018 Graduate Enrollment by Gender

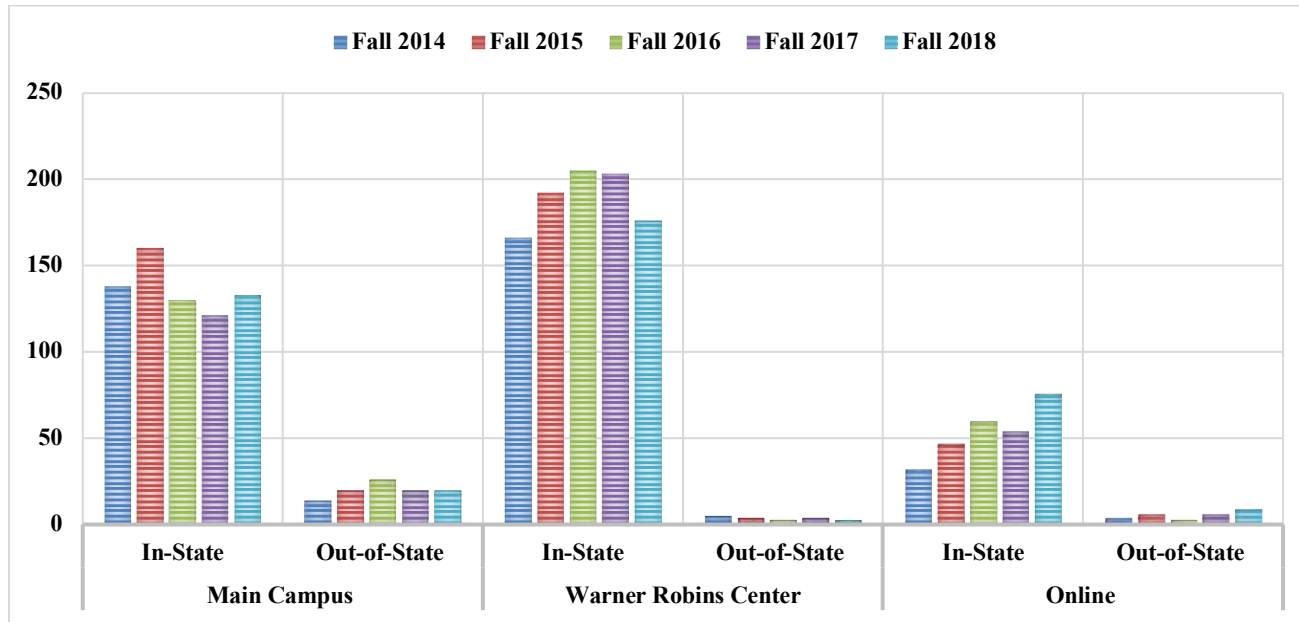

Figure 37: College of Agriculture, Family Sciences and Technology Enrollment Trends by Major

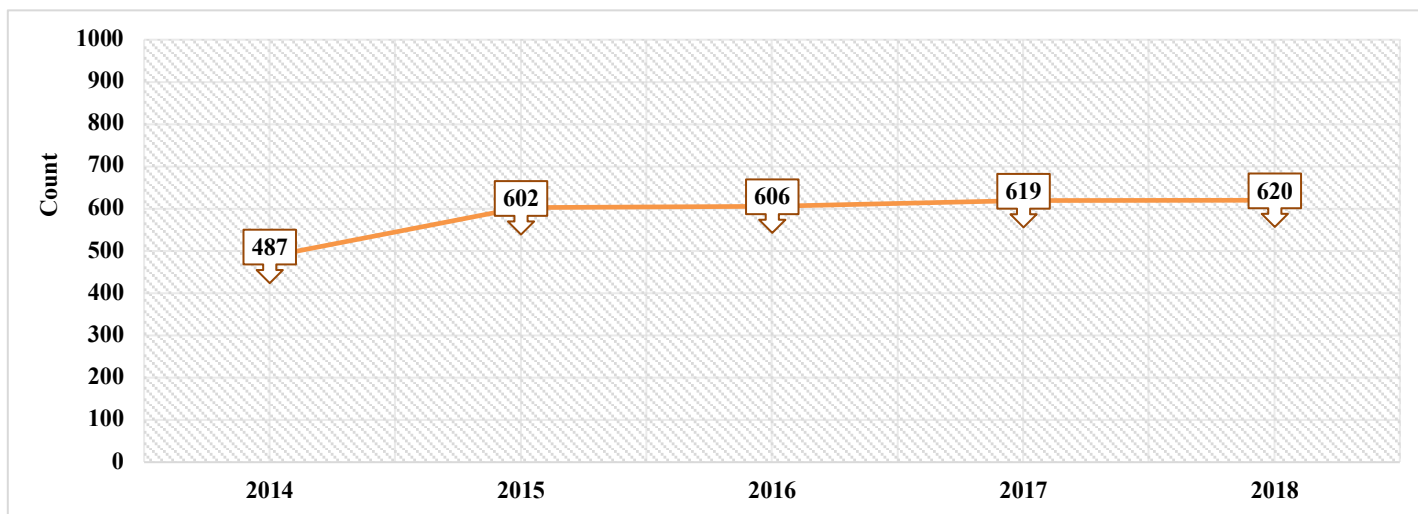

Figure 38: College of Arts and Science Enrollment Trends by Major



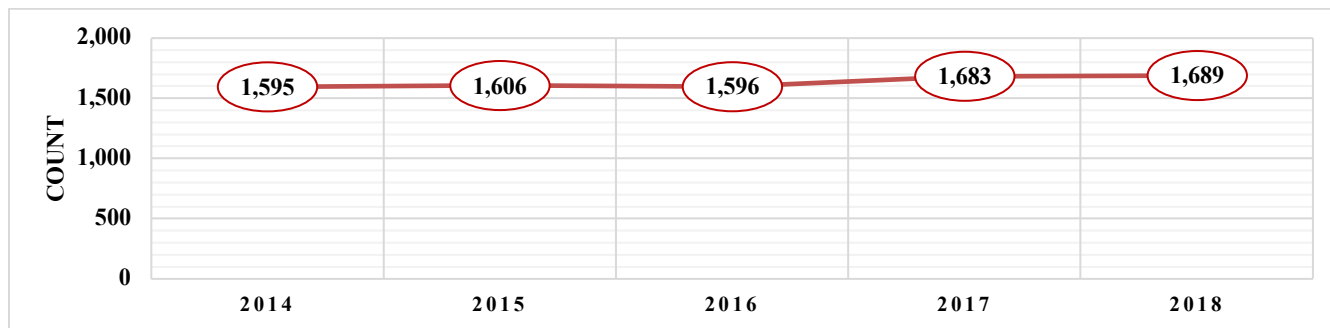
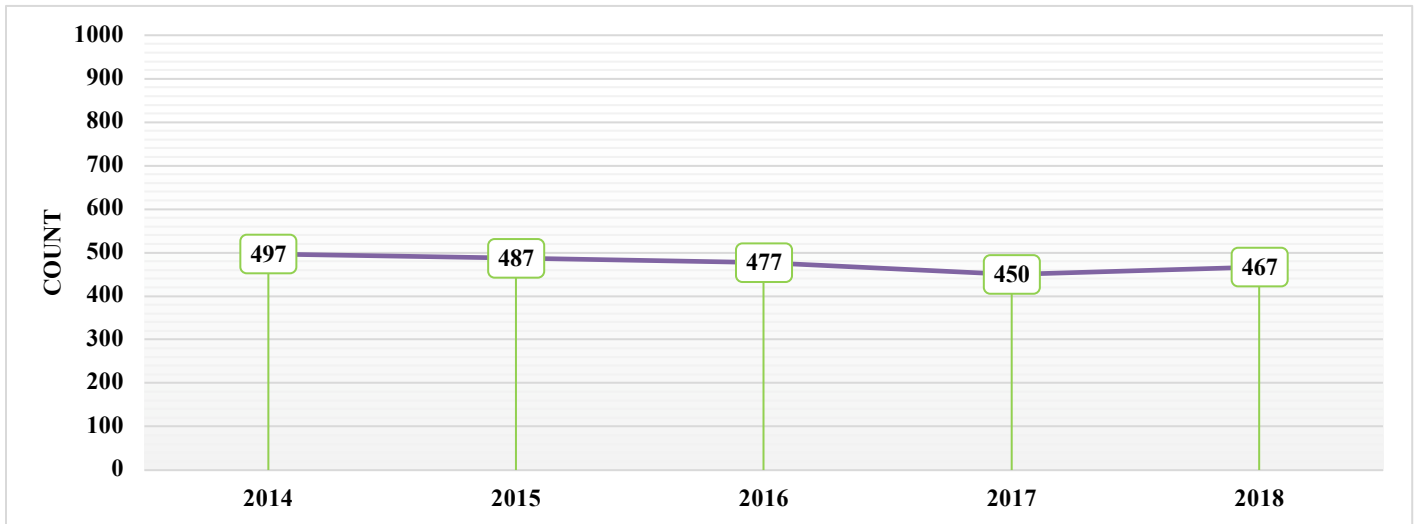

Figure 40: Fall 2014 – Fall 2018 Housing Trends

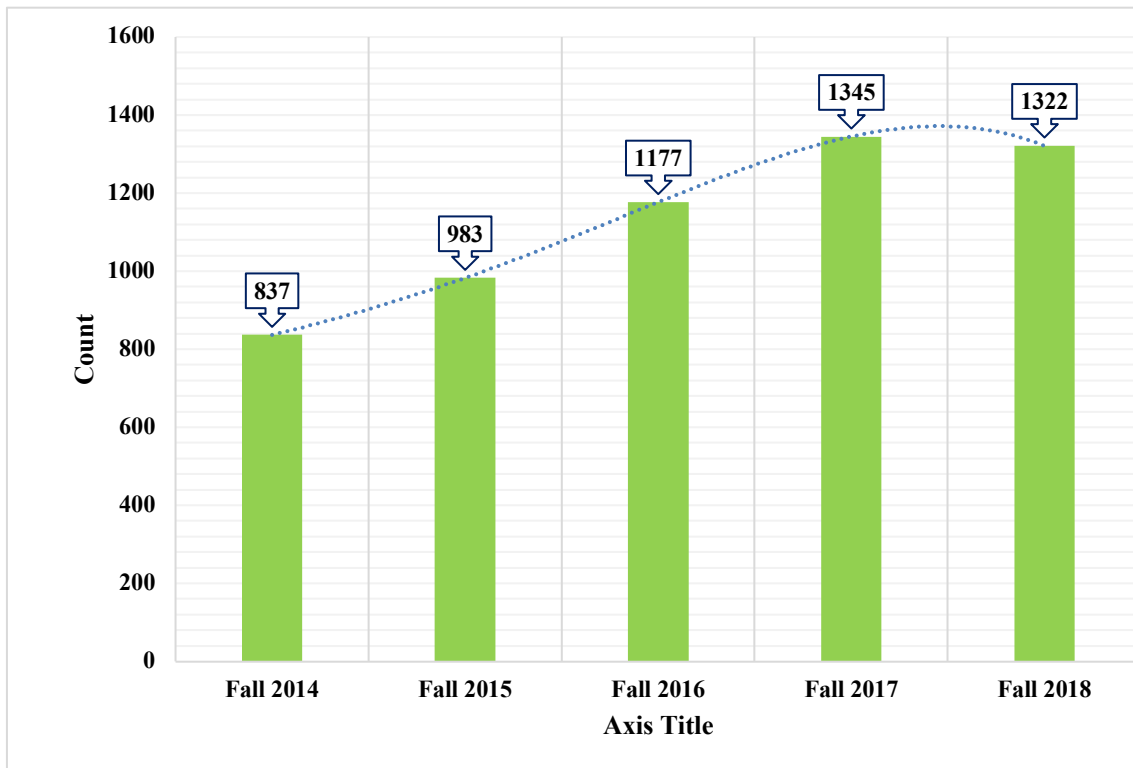

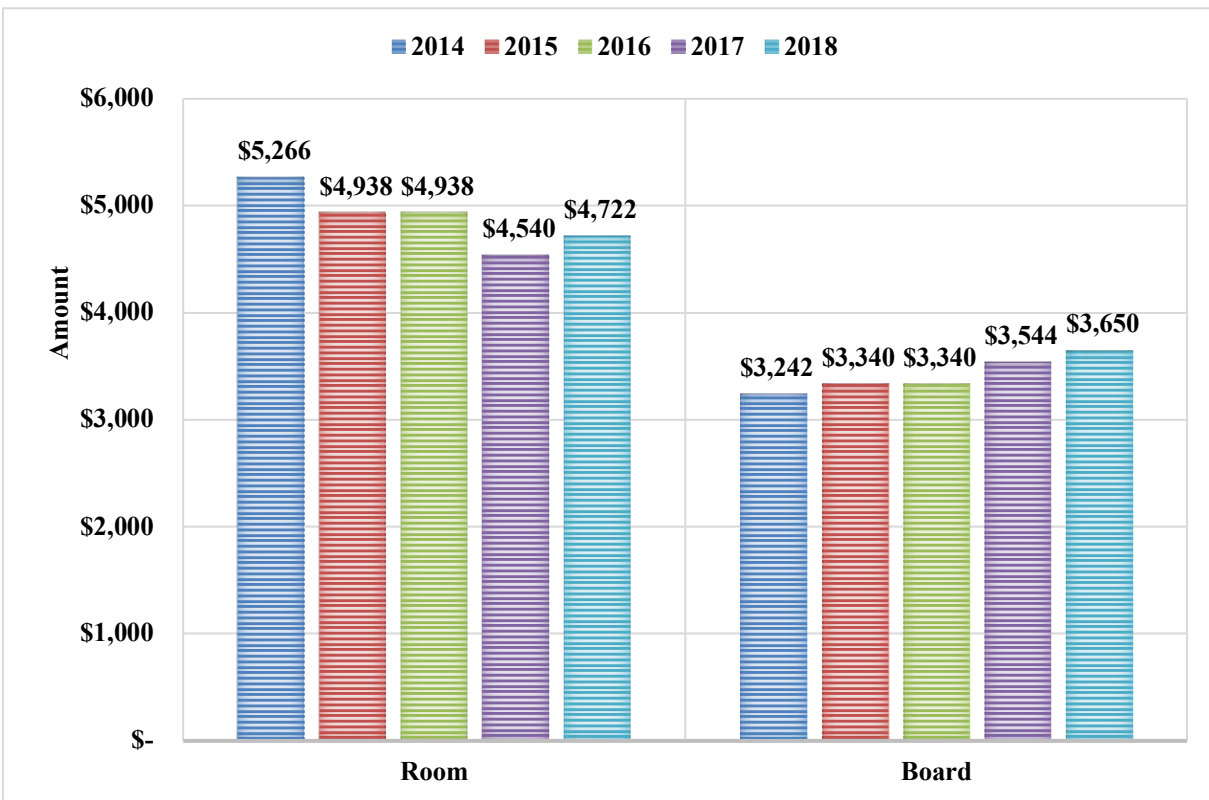

Figure 42: FY 14 – FY 18 Degrees Conferred

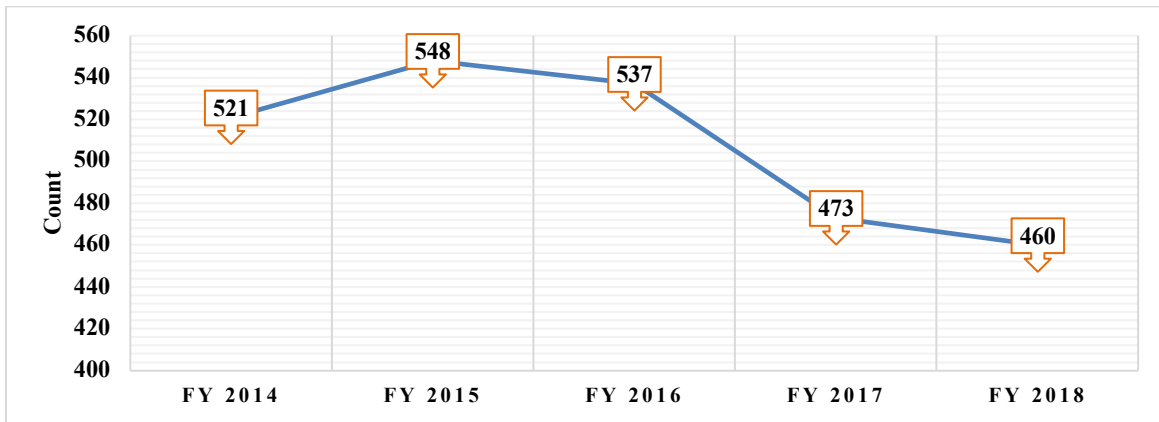


Figure 43: FY 14 – FY 18 Degrees Conferred by Degree Level



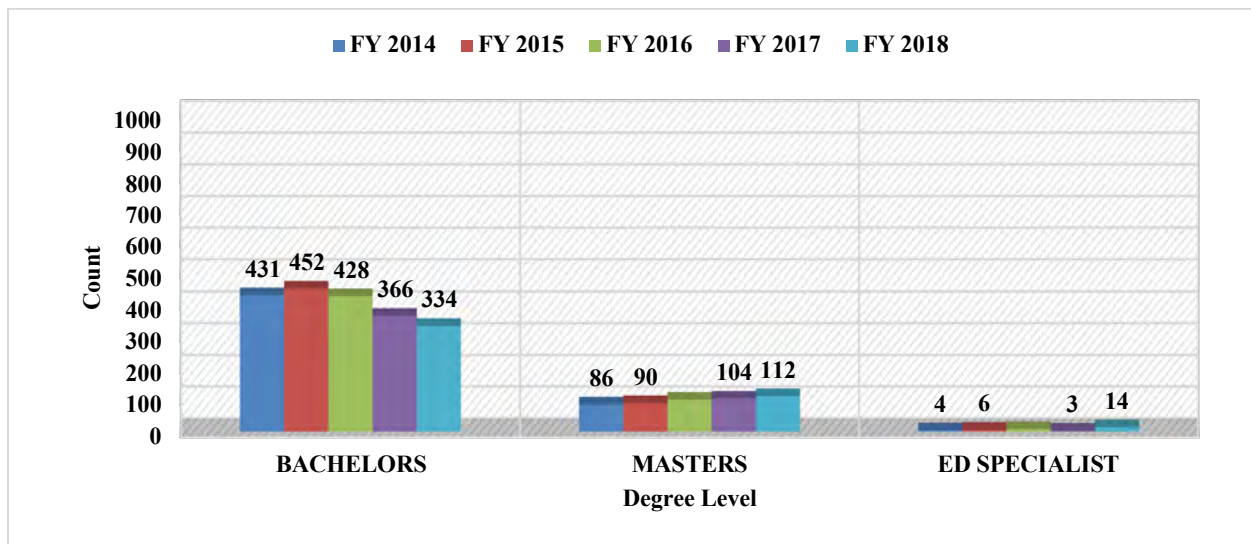

Figure 44: Bachelor Degree Six-Year Graduation Rates

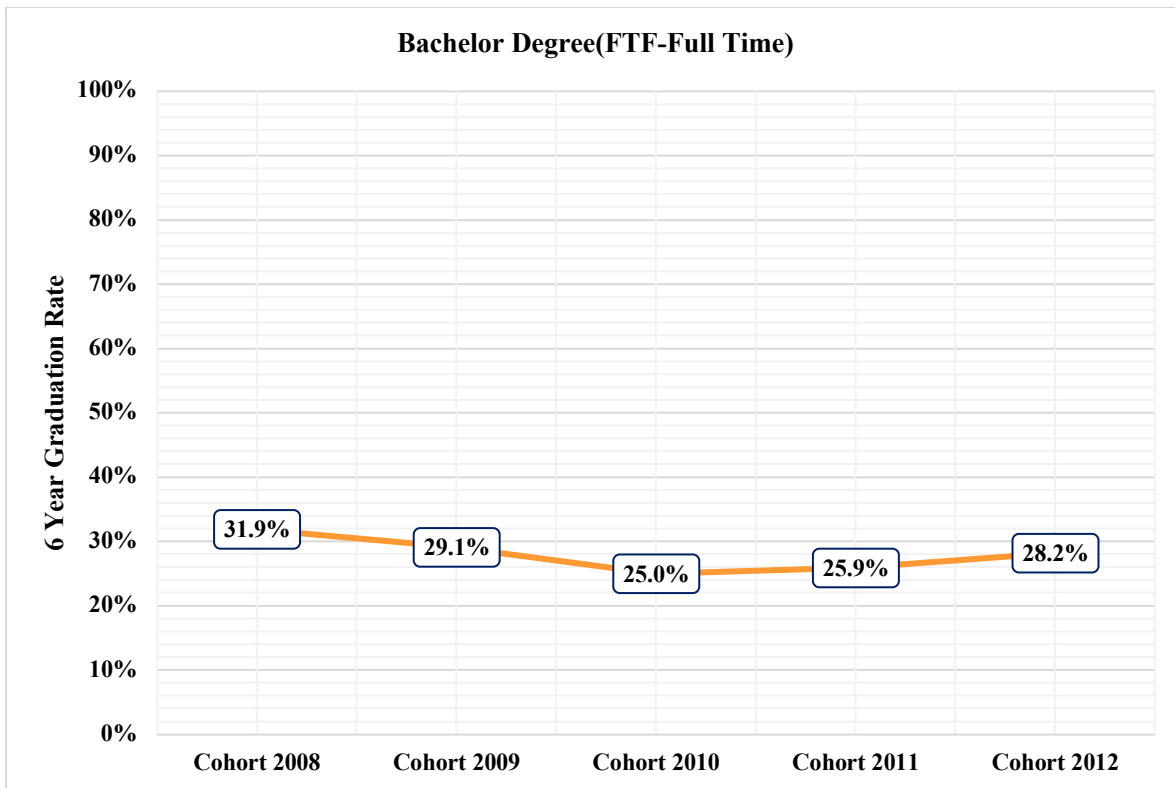
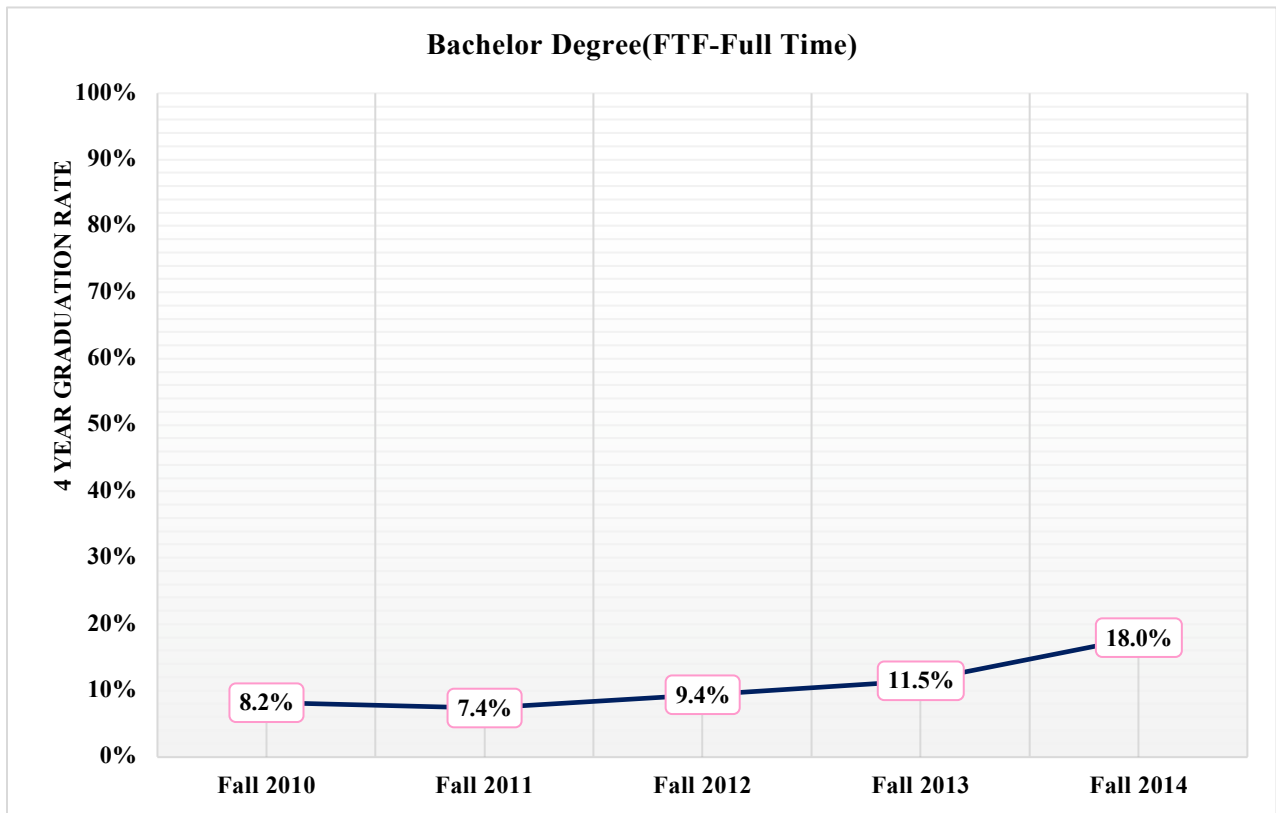

Figure 46: Trends in Institutional Retention Rate

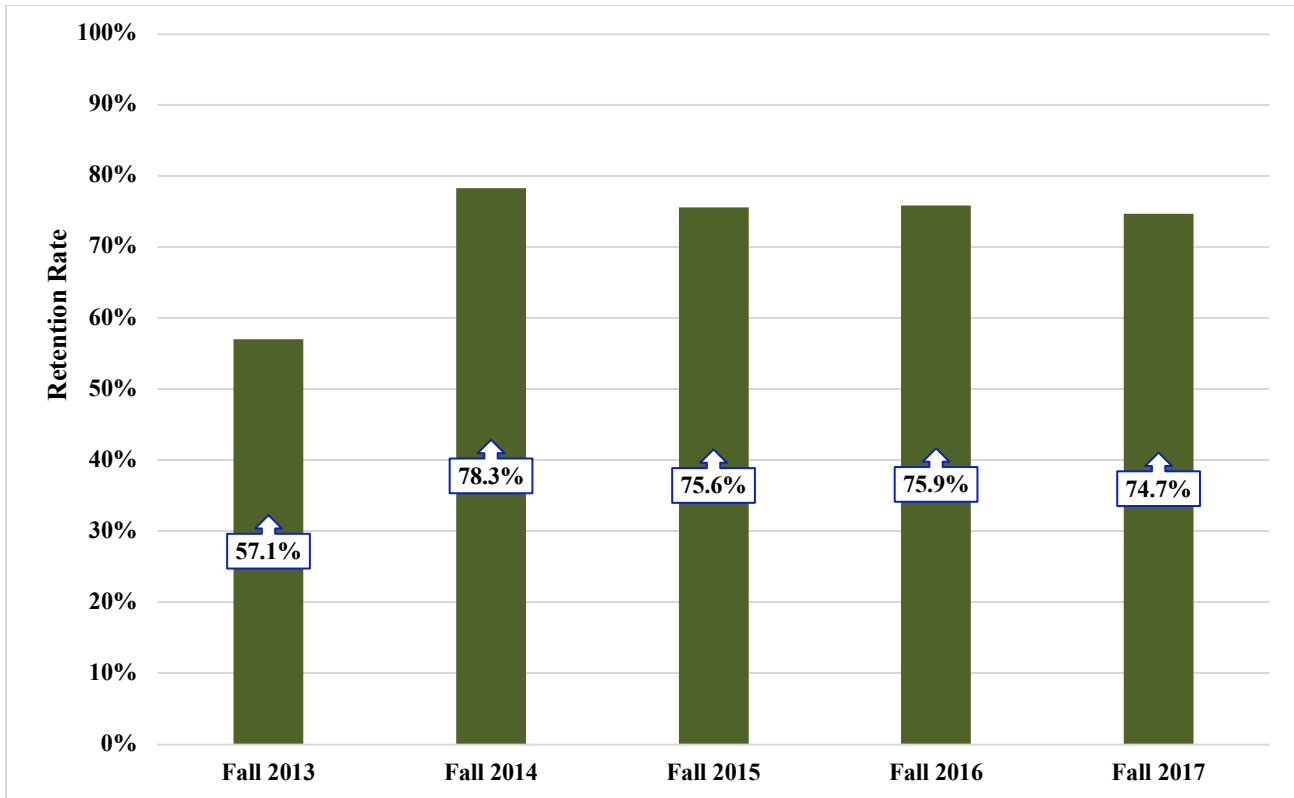

Figure 47: Fall 2018 Faculty and Staff by Gender

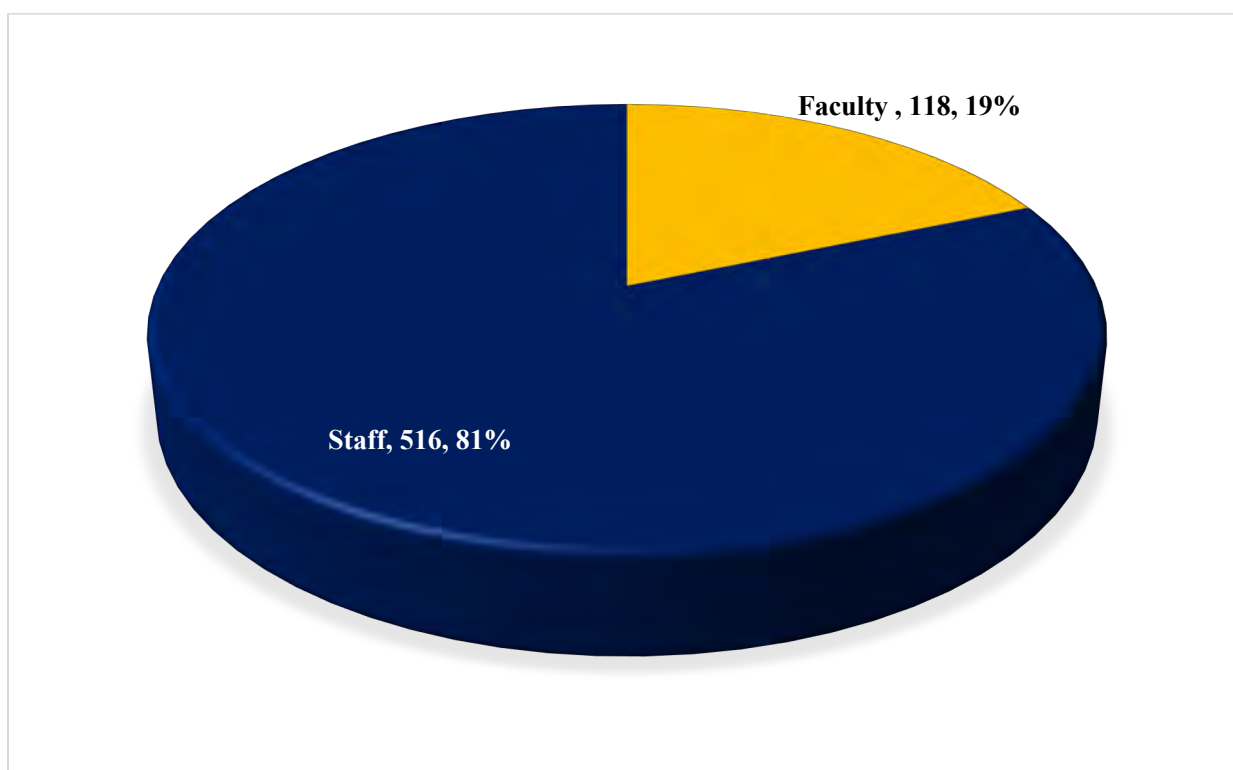

Figure 48: Fall 2018 Faculty by Status

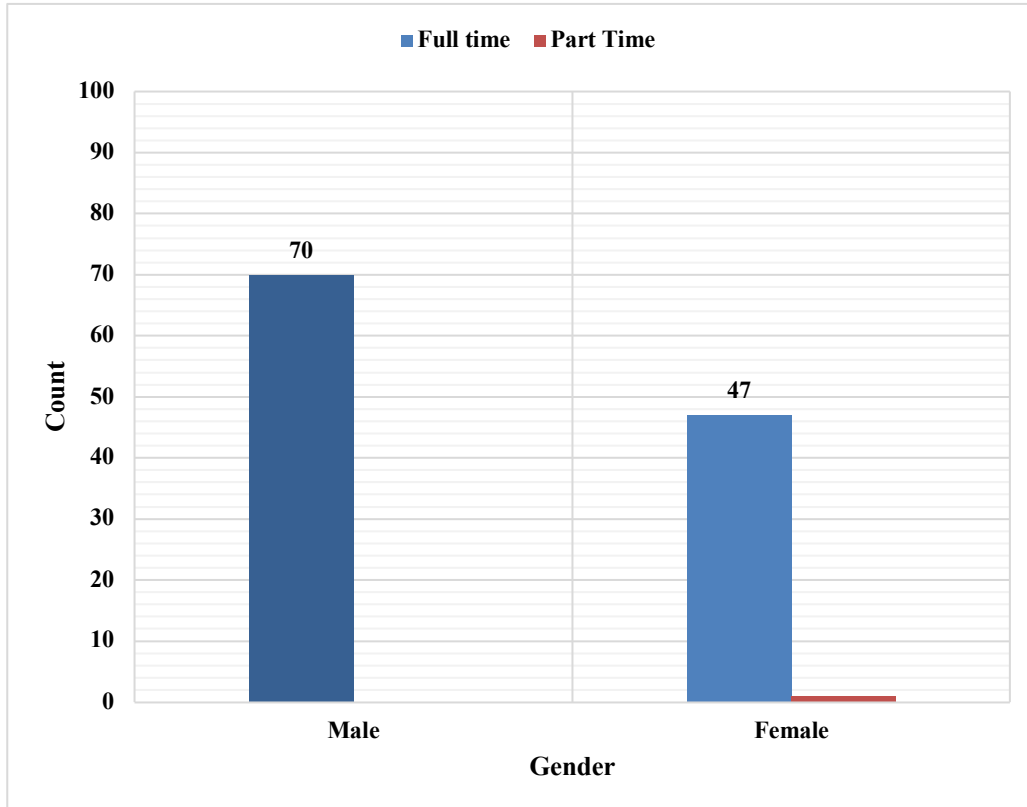
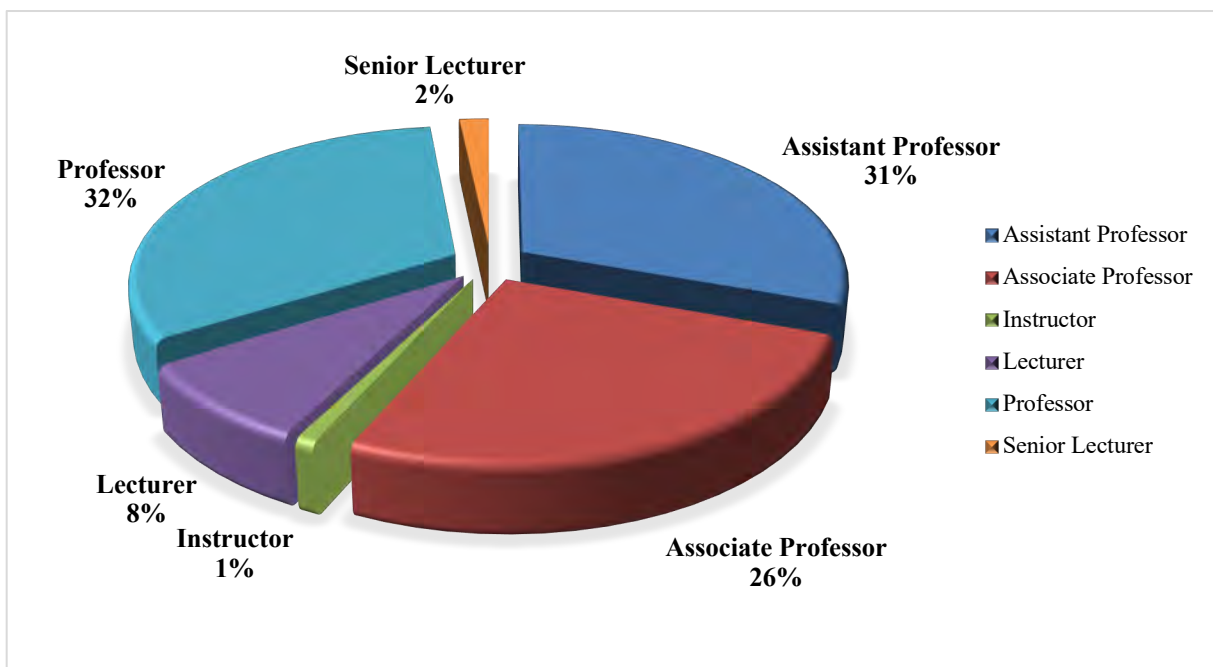

Figure 50: Fall 2018 Faculty by Race/Ethnicity

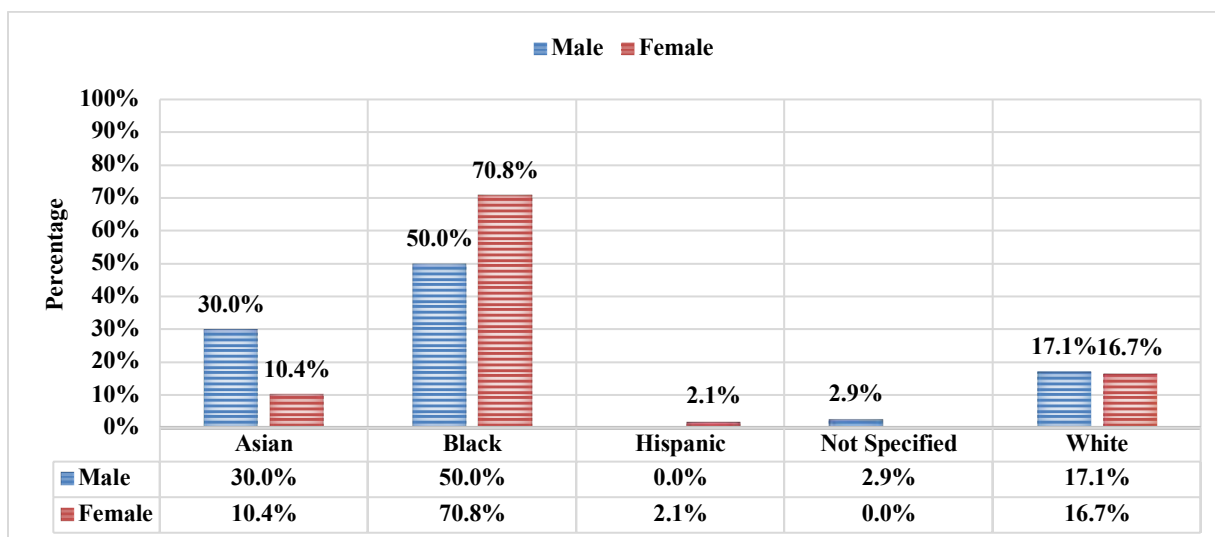
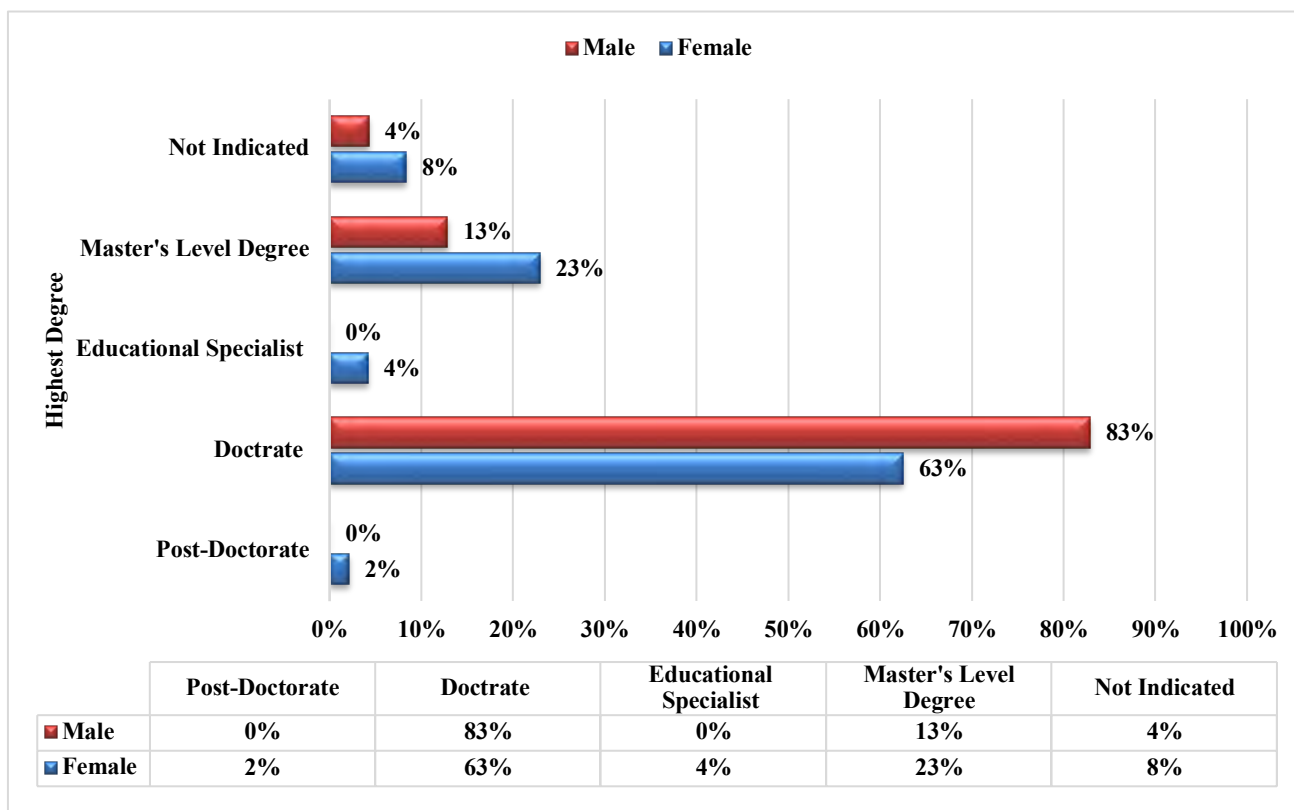
