

Your Rights Under Title IX



- You have a right to report to the Title IX Coordinator when your rights under Title IX have been violated.
- You have the right to file a complaint according to the Title IX Policy.
- You have the right to request a criminal investigation with law enforcement.
- You have the right to temporary remedial measures and supportive services to help you continue to live and learn at FVSU. Such may include, but is not limited to housing or academic modifications.
- You have the right to understand that FVSU is required to undertake a prompt and thorough investigation of all reports of sexual misconduct.
- You have the right to request and obtain a Mutual No Contact Order/Directive.
- You have the right to not be discouraged in your use of resources and processes.
- You have the right to be free from retaliation for exercising your rights.
- You have the right to access on/off campus support and health services. This right is regardless of your race, color, ethnicity, national origin, sex, physical/mental disability, religion, or any other protected class.

What is Title IX?

Everyone has the right to learn, work, and participate in school programs without being treated unfairly because of sex or gender.

Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972 provides: *"No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."*

Let's Talk About... CONSENT...

Consent is defined as words or actions that show a knowing and voluntary willingness to engage in mutually agreed-upon sexual activity.

Consent is absent when the activity in question exceeds the scope of consent previously given. Past consent does not imply present or future consent. Silence or an absence of resistance does not imply consent. Consent may be withdrawn at anytime by wither party by using clear words or actions.

Consent **IS NOT**:

- Gained by force, intimidation, or coercion
- Gained by ignoring or acting in spite of objections of another
- Gained by taking advantage of the incapacitation of another, when that person knows or reasonably should have known or such incapacitation
